**THE ELECTION**

The result of the election in Pitt county Tuesday ought to be gratifying to every citizen for it shows conclusively that the people still have confidence in the way Democrats manage affairs. The voters spoke at the polls in a way not to be misunderstood and that they desired no change. The officers elect will take office on the first Monday in December and they will enter upon their duties with the very best wishes of the entire county.

In North Carolina, as was to be expected, the Democrats rolled up a handsome majority and returned to the senate of the United States, Hon. F. M. Simmons and the probability is elected all ten congressmen. It would have indeed been a calamity to the state if Senator Simmons had failed of re-election for no man in that august body wields more influence with both parties, and no man has never represented this great state that did more for the folks back home. The citizens of the state are to be congratulated upon his re-election for another term of six years to the upper national house.

In the nation the returns indicate that the Republicans have made gains in both the senate and the house, our dispatches going so far yesterday to state that the next house would be Republican and if that either party controlled the senate it would be by a close margin. If the Republicans do get control of the house and senate it will work bad for the country when at the head of the nation they have placed a man whose every act since he became president has been for the betterment of mankind and the safety of Democracy. While the Democrats may be defeated in the national house and senate, history will not erase the fact that they have done things, performed acts that have arrested the attention of the entire world. But for America today Belgium, and France would be in a sadder plight than they are. America with Wilson as its leader came to the rescue and today on foreign soil over two million Americans are fighting with the Allies for the destruction of autocracy and the establishment of peace and accord throughout all the earth. America is the Good Samaritan that is binding up the wounds of bleeding France and Belgium and giving succor to the other nations suffering from the cruel hand of a Kaiser and the hellish principles he stands for.

The grand old party of Wilson may be defeated for a time, Wilson's hands may be tied and petty politics creep in to take the place of duty, but the readers of this paper can remember that the principles of Woodrow Wilson and the Democratic party enunciated since he entered the presidential chair, will ever linger and abide in the hearts and minds of not only every true American but they will be quoted and told to the rising generation of this country and all of the countries of the world.

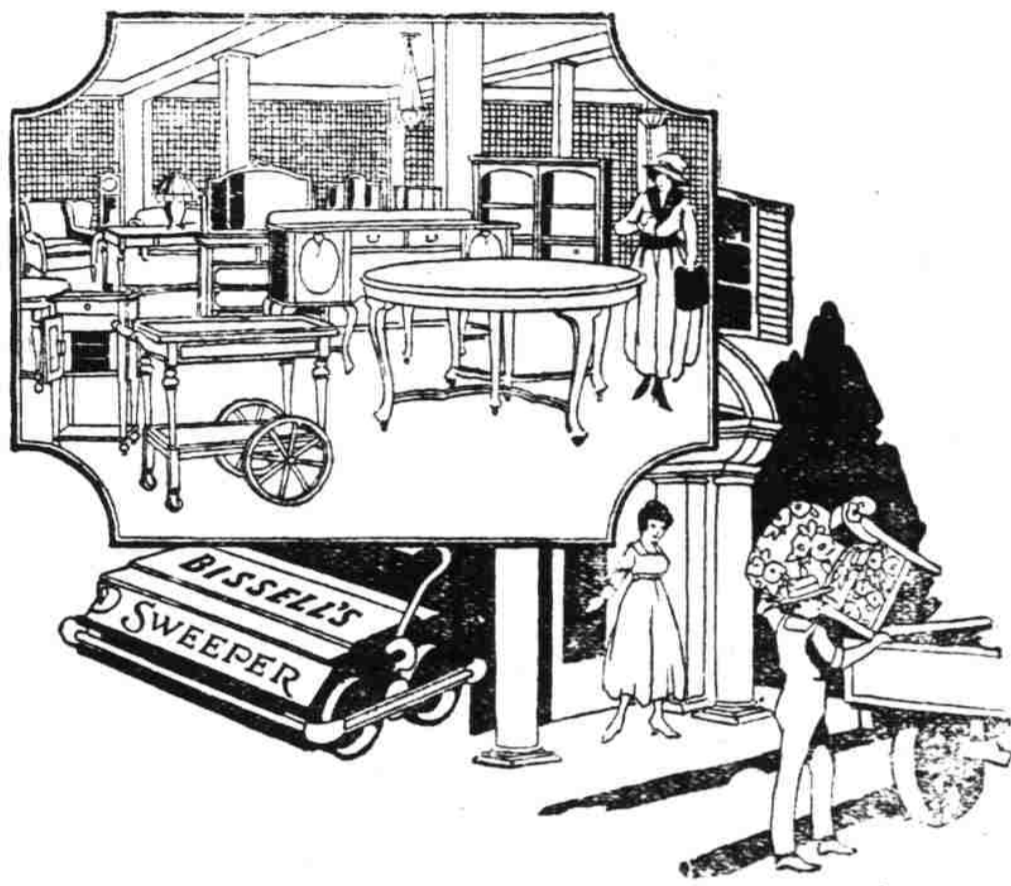
The election is over and the people must take the result. We must not take a back seat in our efforts to make the world free but go on until the goal is accomplished.

In the sixteenth century Oliver de Serres, lord of the Pradel in Vivarais, mentioned the use of nettle for the making of linen in a curious book of his on the "Menage des Champs." Nettle fibre was used in the late Eighteenth Century for the same purpose at Angers, in the Dauphine, and in Languedoc. Until the Boche, out of his necessity began once more to make use of these weeds of the wayside, the old practice had been practically forgotten.

**RULES FOR MAILING CHRISTMAS PACKAGES**

Only one package may be sent to each man enclosed in a carton furnished by the Red Cross. The label issued to the soldier overseas by the army authorities, and forwarded by him to some relative or friend in this country will entitle the holder to apply to the local Red Cross Organization for one carton. The carton must be packed and delivered UNWRAPPED and UNLABELED to the Red Cross to be weighed, inspected, wrapped, labeled and delivered to the postoffice.

No package may weigh over three pounds. No writing may be enclosed.

The sender must furnish postage to Hoboken, N. Y. Inspected parcels must remain in the custody of the Red Cross until delivered by its representatives to the Post Office.

In the event of a label being lost it cannot be replaced. This rule cannot be altered by anybody.

No parcels may be mailed after Nov. 15th. Boxes are now ready for delivery at the Red Cross room any morning from 10 to 12 o'clock.

Any one who cannot fill the box may ask the Red Cross to fill it.

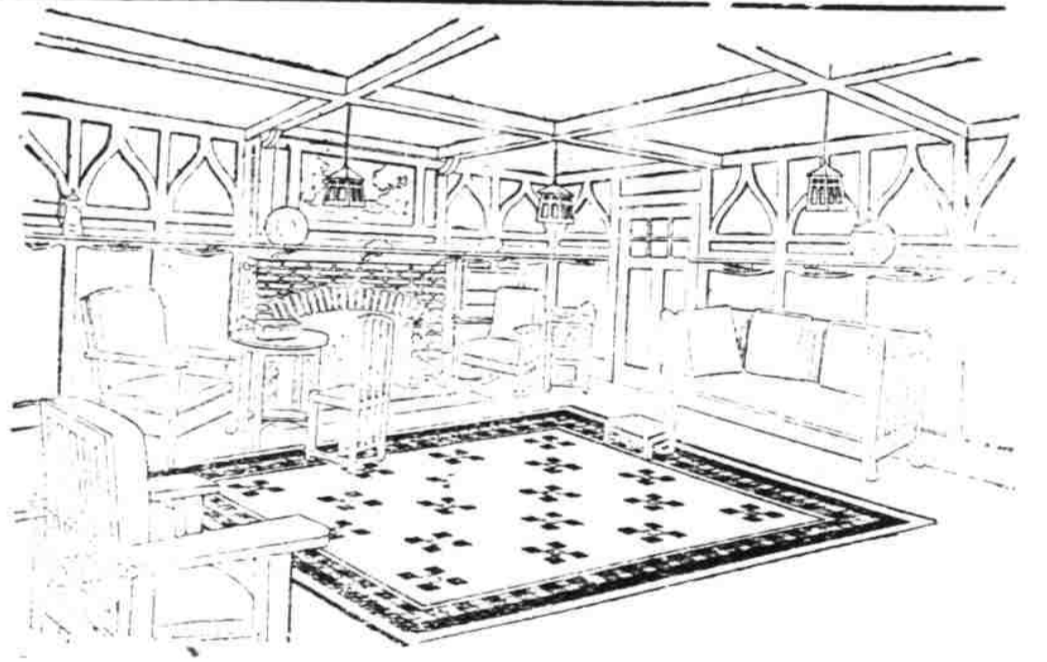
