### Another Boy Writes Home From The Huts

The following letter from overseas has been received from Prvt. Henry C. Crawford, Co. F, 120th Infy by his wife and will prove most interesting reading.

Oct. 7th, 1918.

My Dear Wife:—

I will write you a few lines as I feel better than I have once felt. I am in the hospital, from gas, but I am getting along fine.

I have been over the top one time, and before I went over I did like you asked me to do. I thought of you and asked God to be with me and take me safely back to you. I thank my God for taking me through so safely and He is the only one to look to.

Vallie write to papa and mamma and tell them I am getting on fine and have been over the top and we boys took lots of prisoners on Sunday, Sept. 29th. That was the greatest thing I have ever been into. We boys were in the smoke from 5:30 to 10:30 a. m. Lots of us went through without a scar or scratch, the Lord was with us, and now I am going to be with him.

Willie wanted to know if I had been to the lines, tell him yes, and over the top too and captured some Huns in less than ten minutes after going over, tell him every thing is going on fine and hope they will continue so I hope to be home by New Year's Day. Listen, I have some Hun souvenirs and will send them to you if I get the chance.

We don't stay in the same place only about three days and are nearly always busy.

I am now setting in a Hun's dugout where he was about a week ago, and he is on farther now and I hope we will soon run him off the globe so we boys can soon be in Dear old America,

that is a great old word to me. How is th crops selling this year? Ha many of my brothers been called to camp yet? When I get home I can tell you lots about France for this is a great place. Answer real soon and write lots of news. Your Loving husband.

### Organization Is Perfected For Near Pactolus

At a meeting held in the office of Mr. H. A. White, chairman of the Greenville Township Campaign Committee yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock plans were perfected to conduct an intensive campaign to raise this townships quota of Pitt county's allotment for the United War Work Fund.

The allotment for the county is a little over \$16,000 and Greenville township is expected to raise one fourth of the amount.

To accomplish the work four teams were appointed to solicit funds. They are designated as Teams Nos. 1, 2, 3, and 4, and will work as follows:

Team No. 1—E. G. Flanagan, captain, W. C. Thomas, J. N. Gorman. Territory—All that part of Greenville east of Evans street and Dickerson Avenue.

Team No. 2—B. W. Mosely, captain, G. B. W. Hadley, W. A. Bowen. Territory—All that part of Greenville west of Evans street and Dickerson Avenue.

Team No. 3—C. L. Porter, captain, Guy Smith, E. B. Ficklen. Territory—All that part of the township outside of Greenville proper and North of Tar River.

Team No. 4—W. I. Skinner, captain, W. J. Hardee, L. A. Randolph. Territory—All that part of the township outside of Greenville proper and south of Tar River.
