The market sold this week 525,034 lbs. of which Gormans sold 248,736 lbs.. Our Friday's sale was the largest and best of the week. Gormans sold 70,194 lbs. at an average of \$44.58 for the entire sale and we had 8,540 lbs. of scrap besides the damaged. Deducting the scrap we averaged over 50 cents for this sale.

The Board of Trade has decided to close the sales on Feby. 28th. This will be the last Friday in the month, which gives us 6 weeks yet to sell. Prices are higher than at any time this season and we advise our friends and customers to make an effort to get their tobacco to market before we close.

Double sales will be continued, so it does not make much difference as to the sale, as you can get away early any sale we have; However Gorman's has 2nd sale Monday, 1st Tuesday, 2nd Wednesday, 1st Thursday, 3rd Friday.
