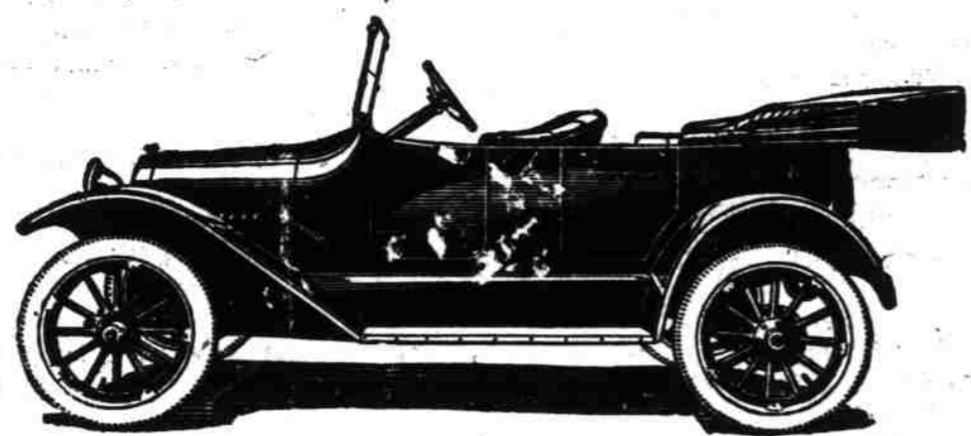

### CHICAGO LABOR GOES TO THE POLLS TO VOTE FOR ITS CANDIDATE

(By United Press)  
 Chicago.—Chicago labor declared a holiday today to see that the city gets the right sort of mayor. Wherever it could be done without too severe a jolt to industry union men absented themselves from their tasks to vote for John Fitzpatrick, the new "labor party's" candidate for the chief executive's job.

Father Dearborn had his pick of six men who are anxious to manage his big municipal business for the ensuing years. They are:

Mayor William Hale Thompson, Republican.

Robert Sweitzer, Democrat.  
 Caclay Hoyne, Independent.  
 John Fitzpatrick, Labor.  
 John Collins, Socialist-Labor.  
 Rudolph Carm, Socialist-Labor.

The elections today formed a stirring climax for a campaign from its pre-primary period.

Hoyne, pointing to his record as State attorney, waged unrelenting war on both men.

The labor party, headed by Fitzpatrick, worked more quietly, but had the backing of most of the city's union men, an organization expected to prove a great help in getting out a silent vote.

Fitzpatrick was expected to detract much from the usual socialist vote. However, both the Socialist and Labor parties were affected by a split which put a third candidate for those votes into the field.

Labor union officials deprecated a tendency among their following to term today's holiday a "one day strike". Industry was not to be hampered, they said, but all men who could were asked to aid at the polls.

### PUBLIC HEALTH DEPENDS ON YOU AND ME

Disease prevention in any town or in any rural community of North Carolina depends upon the average man and woman. The State and the county may establish hospitals and infirmaries and clinics for the treatment of typhoid and tuberculosis and dysentery and the venereal diseases but these diseases will continue and increase until the average citizen practices personal hygiene and takes care not to spread his infection to his family and neighbors.

The classes of diseases which cause more sickness and deaths in the State are the diseases spread through the discharge from the bowel and from the mouth and throat. To prevent these diseases, in the simplest expression of facts, it is merely necessary to keep the bowel discharges of A out of the

mouth of B and to keep the oral discharges of A out of the throat of B. This would prevent tuberculosis, influenza, typhoid, diarrhea, dysentery, and other diseases of this nature.

Personal hygiene is the keynote of prevention of the respiratory diseases. We have not yet learned how to prevent outbreaks of colds, bronchitis, pneumonia, and influenza, but we do know that their spread could be checked if the principles of personal hygiene were universally practiced.

During the last three months of 1918 people took unusual precautions to prevent the spread of influenza and as a result measles and whooping cough practically disappeared from the State.

The responsibility for the spread of an infectious disease lies with the individual. It is the infected person's duty toward his neighbor, to prevent

the spreading of his germs to his fellow men; it is his duty to himself on the part of everybody, to guard against contracting these diseases. The State Board of Health believes that when the people accept the slogan "Public health depends on you and me" and act with it, that infections will disappear.

### SAN FRANCISCO PORT NOW FREE TO OFF-SHORE SHIPS

San Francisco.—The port of San Francisco today became free to all foreign and off-shore ships.

The move is expected greatly to increase the business of this port with trans-Pacific points.

Commerce with the Hawaiian Islands and Alaska and the Atlantic seaboard will be considered off-shore or foreign trade.

The action eliminates entirely the dockage rate and cuts fifty per cent off the wharfage charges of ships having regular berths. "Tramp" ships are free from all dockage charges.

Rates for fresh water were also cut from \$150 to \$38 for 100,000 gallons—the average amount for ordinary cargo ships.
