

Personal hygiene is the keynote of prevention of the respiratory diseases. We have not yet learnd how to prevent outbreaks of colds, bronchitis, pear. pneumonia, and influenza, but we do know that their spread could be checked if the principles of personal hy giene were universally practiced. During the last three months of 1918 people took unusual precautions to prevent the spread of influenza and as a result measles and whooping cough practically disappeared from the State.

The responsibility for the spread of an infectious disease lies with the individual. It is the infected person's duty toward his neighbor, to prevent
