### THE ISLAND OF ST. LUCIA. B. W. I. Education.

Steady progress has been made in elementary education in St. Lucia. Number of schools 42. Number of children on roll 5,735. Number of children in average attendance 3,188. There are no government schools, all the schools, being denomination and assisted. They may be classed as follows: Anglican, 4; Methodist, 2; Indian Mission, 2; Roman Catholics, 35. The almost universal pervasiveness of the French Patriotic, known as Creole, has been a great bar to the progress of education, for though it is forbidden to be used in the school it has been found almost impossible to strictly enforce the rule. For the last two the administrator has generously given prizes,

amounting to \$96.00, as reward to the Creole speaking children attending primary schools in St. Lucia who have made the most progress in the speaking of English. Though there is an ordinance making it compulsory for parents to send their children to school, it has not been found practicable to put it in force. Nevertheless, the percentage of children attending school has risen 11.7 per cent, of the population.  
Secondary education is provided for boys at St. Mary's College, Castries, which receives a grant aid of \$1000; and for girls at the Convent, Castries which receives \$100 a year. The boys are prepared for the Cambridge local and the girls for the College of Preceptors examinations.
