## ST. MARK'S GOSPEL BY REV. CHAS. H. BASCOM Rector St. Paul's Episcopal Church

The early Christian writers unambiguously ascribe this gospel to a man named John whose Roman surname was Marcus. He was the nephew of St. Barnabas, and his mother Mary had a house in Jerusalem. He was a disciple of St. Peter (1 Peter 5:13) and a "minister" to St. Paul (Acts 13:5).

St. Mark traveled with Sts. Paul and Barnabas for a time, but for some unknown reason, of which St. Paul did not approve, he left them during the first missionary journey (Acts 13:13). There was a complete reconciliation afterwards and St. Paul testifies to the comfort he had been to him (Col. 4:10, 11). St. Mark was with St. Peter when he wrote his first Epistle from Babylon (1 Peter 5:1-3), and after the death of the two great apostles, he is said to have worked in Egypt and is regarded as the founder of the Coptic church. From the earliest times traditions declared that St. Mark wrote what he heard from St. Peter. Bishop Papias calls him "the interpreter of Peter," and says that he "wrote down particulars just as he remembered them." Justin Martyr (100-166 A. D.) calls the gospel "the memories of Peter," and Origen (185-265 A. D.) says "Mark made his gospel as Peter guided him." The gospel is all through exactly what we should expect from St. Peter. It tells only of the three years of our Lord's ministry, the time St. Peter was with him. The story is so vivid and detailed that we cannot doubt it was told by an eye witness, and by one more given to energetic action than to quiet listening or thoughtful reading. We hear much more of what Jesus did than of what He

said. Eighteen miracles are recorded but only four parables, and only one prophecy from the Old Testament is quoted (1:2, 3). It was probably written at Rome between 64 and 68 A. D. The last twelve verses of the last chapter were almost certainly written by someone else. They contain 21 one words and expressions never used in the gospel.

**FIVE WAYS TO MAKE YOUR BATTERY LAST LONGER**  
A list of five short rules on battery care has been made up for car drivers by Mr. H. M. Phillips, the local Willard expert. These rules are easy to remember, and if observed, will have a marked effect on both battery efficiency and life:

1. Keep battery charged and filled to the proper level with the distilled water.
2. If your engine doesn't start quickly make sure that gas and spark are right.
3. Release starter at once when engine begins to run on its own power.
4. Keep your spark plugs in good condition.
5. Prime the engine if it's cold.
