DEMORALIZED BOLSHEVIKI ARE FLEEING EVERYWHERE IN GREAT **DISORDER SAYS LATE REPORTS**

Minister of War Says That Out of a Quater of a Million Russians Participating in the Warsaw Offensive, Only 140,000 Have Been Accounted For, Nearly All Of The Other Detachments Having Been Shot to Pieces.-Poland's Reply to the Peace Terms of the Russians a Flat Rejection.

London, Aug. 25.-Krassin and Kameneff, Russian representatives here, have applied for a passport and will start for the city of Moscow Friday unless the British change their attitude towards extending recognition to the Soviets the newspapers here

Warsaw, Aug. 5 .- The reports from various fronts indicate that the Bolsheviki are demoralized and fleeing everywhere in great disorder. The Minister of War says that out of a quarter of a million Russians participating in the Warsaw effensive only one hundred and forty thousand have been accounted for and that nearly all of the other attachments have been shot to pieces.

London, Aug. 25.—Poland's reply to the peace terms of the Russians amounts to a flat rejection says the Manchester Guardian's Minsk correspondent in a wireless message which was filed last Monday.
