Some of the Old Captains Trifle Dubious of this New-Fangled Method

St. John's, N. F., Nov. 29 .- Captains of the Newfoundland sealing fleet look forward to a big "kill," among the seal herds this season under the ar rangement by which the fleet will be guided by two airships whose duty it will be to act as scouts, search for the herds of young seals and send word of their location by wireless.

Some of the old captains profess to be a triffle dubious of this new-fangled method of hunting the seals, but they are all awaiting the experiment with anticipation and hope of greater profits than ever before.

Word has been received here that the two non-rigid airships, popularly known as "blimps," which are to be used in this work have been shipped from England to make this first attempt to hunt seals from the air and by use of the wireless. The expedition, which altogether includes b airships, is under the command of Frank J. Tippen, consulting airshp engineer and constructor to the Newfoundland government, an expert in the design of large commercial airship. BLAME TRADE UNION FOR THE SHORTAGE

Says Union is Responsible for Scarcty of Houses Now in England

London, Nov. 29 .- Dr. Christopher Addison, Minister of Health, blames the trades unions in part for the shortage of houses in England. In an article in the Times he points out that there has been a great shrinkage of bricklayers, carpenters, masons and other branches of the building trades and says there are now not enough men in these trades to do the work. Yet, he adds, there are thousands outside of the trades who are unemployed but if an attempt were to be made to use them in building houses "we are faced with the trade union bar." The unions contend that if their numbers are unduly inflated now, the unemployment among them will be even greater than ever when the present demand for homes has been satisfied. Admitting this, Dr. Addison asks "In the face of the national demand for houses, in the face of the widepread of unemployment among exservice men and others, can any trade union maintain its restrictions?
