eachers Not Allowed to Admit Pupils Who Have Not Been Immunized From Smallpox.

Children in County Schools This Year Must Comply With Regulations Adopted By County Board of Health.

The regulations passed by the ance County Board of Health requiring all children attending the public schools in the county to be vaccinated against smallpox are to be rigidly enforced this year, Dr. D. C. Absher, county health officer, stated today. The rule provides that all teachers shall refuse admission to their schools to any children who have not been sucessfully vaccinated. The penalty imposed upon any teacher violating this rule is fixed at \$50. The rule of the Board of Health is as follows:

"No teachers of any public or private day school shall allow any child or pupil to enter or remain in school unless the said child or pupil shall have been successfully vaccinated against smallpox, nor until such child or pupil shall present a certificate from a physician stating that such child or pupil has been vaccinated during the 10 days immediately previous to entrance in such school, or that such child or pupil is physically unable to be vaccinat-

A like fine of \$50 is also provided against violation of the ruling of the County Board of Health in regard to the reporting of measles, whooping cough, scarlet fever, and

"All cases of measles, whooping cough, scarlet fever, and diphtheria, must be reported to the health officer within twenty-four hours, by the physician, if one is attending the case, and if no doctor is attending the case, the parent must report. Failure to report makes parent or doctor liable to a fine of \$50."
