Behind closed doors of his cabiret room President Hoover in an exemporaneous speech outlined to half a hundred civic leaders h's plan for creating and anti-hoarding machine.


# POU WILL MANAGE

# Piedmont Section Holds **Key To Primary Victory**

Raleigh, Feb. 6.—The Democrats in the Piedmont section of the State hold the key to the political situation in North Carolina, and the candidate who wins the Dimocratic comination fo rGovernor in June will be the candidate who can garner the most votes in the 32 counties that compose tre Piedmont, according to the political heads here who have made a close study of the outcome of past Democratic primaries. This applies to the contest for the nominatien for the U. S. Senate as well as

for the governorship. As a result of this belief—and a study of the figures confirms it—the candiate that win the nomination tither for Governor or Senator in the forth-coming primary, must make a stronger race in the Piedmont than anywhere else. For the candidate that is able to roll up a big majority in the Fiedmont counties will be able to win the nomination, even if the

east and west should go against him. For while it is true that a larger number of Democratic votes are cast both in the eastern and western divisions of the State than in the Pied-

mont counties, it is also a fact that almost without exception, the majorities given by the Piedmont are invariably larger and that the Piedmont majorities are the ones that nominate the candidates.

So if any one of the various can didates either J. C. B. Ehringhaus. A. J. Maxwell or R. T. Fountain for Governor or Senator Cameron Morrison, Rabert R. Reynolds, Frand D Grist or Tam C. Bowie for U. S. Senator—can merely manage to hold their own in the east and west but get a good sized majority in the Pledmont, he can be pretty sure to

win the nomination. The results of the McLean-Bailey primary in 1924, the Overman-Rey-nolds contest in 1926 and of the Bailey-Simmons struggle in 1928 tend

to bear out thi, sbelief.

## Interest In Campaign For Governor Lacking

imers here are continuing to marvel at the apparent apathy on the part of Democrats generally over the State toward the contest for the Democratic nomination for Governor. They point out that not in years has the time ever gotton so close to the primary with so much uncertainty as to the contest for the nomination, and with so few apparently committed to any

By the close of the 1919 general assembly, almost every member was de-finitely pledged to support either Max Gardner, Cameron Morrison or Robert Page, it is recalled, by this time in 1920, Gardner and Mozrison were shelling the woods and each other and keeping batteries of stenographers busy writing letters, sending out campaign material. Gardner had a corps of 12 stenographers at work in his headquarters, he recalls. The McLean-Bailey campaign in 1924 also warmed up much earlier than the pre-sent one and definite alignments had been formed long before February,

little apparent interest in the gubernatorial campaign and with no one able to tell about the trend or what candidate seems to be in the lead, has political circles somewhat worried.

"It merely goes to show that the instinct of self-preservation seems to the stronger than anything else and that people have been so busy looking out after their own affairs and trying to solve their own problems that they have had either the time or inclination to become interested in politics as yet," one observer remarked today. "However, although many have not yet said who they are for, many have undoubtedly already decided whom they are going to vote

Opinion here in Raleigh is that while none of the three candidates for Governor hay emade much progress recently, that A. J. Maxwell has probably made more progress within the last month or six weeks than either R. T. Fountain or J. C. Ehringhaus, largely because conditions have served to accentuate Maxwell's program more than those of the others. But no one is making any predictions about the final outcome of
