Mountain Higaiway ALMOST COMPLETED

Only Half Mile Through Smoky Mountains Park Unfinished

Raleigh, Feb. 16.-Onl; the last half mile on the highway through the Great Smoky Mount; ain National Park. connecting Rout to 10 with the Tennessee highway system near Smokemount, remains to be graded, Chairman E. B. Jeffress of the State Highway Commission, said today. As soon as this half mil : is graded and the entire strip of now highway surfaced, it will afford a new and virtually the only routs: through the heart of the Smoky Mountains National Park area, as well as a new

gateway into Tenner:see.

It will probably by May or June before this entire strip of highway can be surfaced and re dy for travel, Mr. Jeffress said, since the road runs at a very high altitu 1: and is in a section of the mour sains where the weather is precaritius. However it is expected that the road will be completed and open to traffic in plenty of time for the spring and summe tourist season. The Highway Commission expects it to become one of the most travelled routes anywhere in western North Cer olina and that thou sands of tourists wil use it in getting as far as possible into the National Park area.
