

Raleigh, May 9.—The value of cotton goods produced in North Caroduring 1929 was slightly over \$317,000,000, according to census figurges released through the Department of Conservation and Develop ment today. In the United States all cotton goods produced in the same year were valued at just under \$1,-485,000,000.

From these figures it is evident that North Carolina produces 21.3 percent of all the cotton goods manufactured in the United States, thus displacing Massachusetts, which has led all the states in this respect for
