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CANDIDATES CONFIDENT AS VOTE COUNT NEARS

Signatures Needed To Take Bonus Bill From Committee Are Obtained In The House

VOTE ON JUNE 13 FIRST OPPORTUNITY UNDER THE RULES

No Demonstration on Floor as Texan Affixes Signature as 145th Name Required

BONUS MARCHERS IN CLEVELAND CLUBBED

Police Knock One Man Unconscious in Railroad Yards, Where They Seek Ride to Washington; Group in Blacksburg, S. C., Intercepted by Police

Washington, June 4 (AP)—Cash bonus advocates today secured the 145 signatures necessary to force a House vote Monday, June 13, on the \$2,000,000,000 full payment issue.

The 145th signature was put on the bill just as Speaker Garner called for a vote on final house action on the tax bill.

There was no demonstration as Representative Garrett Democrat, Texas, put his name on the petition, while House members waited for the vote on the tax bill.

Under the rules, the motion to take the bonus bill away from the Ways and Means Committee, which reported it adversely, cannot be voted upon before June 13. If Congress has not adjourned on that date for the two party conventions, a vote will be in order.

POLICE AND MARCHERS IN HOT CLASH IN CLEVELAND

Cleveland, Ohio, June 4 (AP)—Police and about 100 bonus marchers clashed in the Pennsylvania railroad yards today when the veterans made a futile attempt to storm the round house to obtain transportation to Washington.

One of the marchers was beaten into unconsciousness and several others fell before a charge of mounted police officers, swinging riot clubs from the saddle.

The group of marchers numbered about 100, part of the main body of about 1,000 men who earlier were quietly moved out of the yards by several hundred police reserves, after blocking the Pennsylvania main lines during the night.

TRAIN STOPPED AND MEN OUSTED AT BLACKSBURG

Blacksburg, S. C., June 4 (AP)—Two hundred bonus marchers, northward bound on a Southern Railway freight train, struck a snag here this afternoon when railway officials stopped the train on which the "marcher" were going to Washington, and refused to permit it to continue.

Report Hindenburg To Resign, Birthday

Berlin, June 4 (AP)—A prominent German Nationalist source predicted today that President Paul von Hindenburg would retire on his 86th birthday October 2, and urged the selection of former Crown Prince Friedrich Wilhelm von Hohenzollern as his successor.

Hausner Presumably Safe Over Atlantic En Route To Europe

(By the Associated Press.) Stanislaus Hausner sailed today the route of high adventure—airways over the Atlantic from New York to Europe.

Since 5 o'clock last night, eastern standard time, there has been no word of his progress. He had no wireless and the only possibility of news of him rested in the few ships plowing the waters over which his huge Belanca monoplane charted its course.

But there was no worry. This afternoon, perhaps, if he is unreported or unreported, there may be occasion for concern.

The early part of today, however, presumably finds the Poland-born American droming along 100 miles an hour over lonesome wastes of water. At 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon his monoplane was reported seen over Halifax. Two hours later the plane was observed over Sydney, Nova Scotia. This indicated Hausner followed the coast line until he reached the tip of Cape Breton, at which point he is believed to have pointed the nose of his orange-painted plane over the Atlantic.

Two Kidnapers at Pinehurst Nabbed

Pinehurst, June 4 (AP)—Thwarting of an attempt to extract \$5,000 from Verner Z. Reed, Jr., wealthy sportsman of Glenn Cove, L. I., and Pinehurst, under threats of kidnaping him and his two small children, was revealed today by police.

Two men who, police said, confessed to writing Reed a letter and demanding the \$5,000, were arrested. They were Howard Dean and Joe Lucas, both of Roseland. The letter, mailed in Pinehurst, besides threatening the kidnaping, said Reed's home would be bombed if he failed to leave the money at a spot named in the note.

ROOSEVELT TO GET WALKER CASE SOON

Seabury Promises To Present Testimony on Mayor Early Next Week

New York, June 4 (AP)—The Walker case, which promises to reverberate into national politics, will be before Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt next week.

Investigator Samuel Seabury, who has declared there are grounds to remove Mayor James J. Walker, said last night he would rush the official record of the case to Governor Roosevelt "as early next week as possible."

His statement came after the governor, in a sharp statement, called on the legislative investigating committee and Seabury, its counsel, to "stop talking and do something," if in their judgement circumstances warranted action.

BRITAIN AND ITALY SIGN MORATORIUM

Washington, June 4 (AP)—Great Britain and Italy today signed the formal agreement postponing international debts for one year from last July 1 under the moratorium proposed by President Hoover.

NOT GUILTY PLEA GIVEN BY CURTIS AT ARRAIGNMENT

Norfolk "Negotiator" In Lindbergh Case Sent Back To Jail For Trial On June 27

SEEMS UNCONCERNED AT THE PROCEDURE

Dressed in Dark Blue Suit and Eyes Judge Keenly, Thanking Him at Close of The Hearing; Reading of Indictment Is Waived by Curtis

Flemington, N. J., June 4 (AP)—John Hughes Curtis entered a plea of not guilty today to an indictment charging him with hindering capture of the kidnap-murderer of the Lindbergh baby.

Trial was set for June 27 as soon as the plea was entered.

Curtis, who pleaded not guilty despite his own confession to police, entered court dressed in a dark blue suit. He seemed entirely unconcerned, and there was a faint smile on his face as he looked directly at the judge. He waived reading of the indictment and was remanded to jail in lieu of bail.

Court was convened at 9:37 a. m. EST. Judge Robins announced from the bench that "a matter of importance" was to come before the court and warned that no demonstration of any kind would be tolerated.

As soon as the brief proceedings were over, Curtis was told that he was remanded to jail to await the trial. He nodded his head.

"Thank you very much," he said, speaking directly to the judge.

CONFEREES' REPORT ADOPTED IN HOUSE

Revenue Measure Goes Finally to Senate; Relief Bill Offered

Washington, June 4 (AP)—The new \$118,000,000 revenue bill neared final enactment today with adoption of the conference report by the House.

Next the Senate must act, and then the compromise bill goes to President Hoover for signing.

House approval was by a viva voce vote.

The administration's relief bill, sponsored by Secretary Mills of the Treasury, was introduced in the Senate today by Senator Barbour, Republican, New Jersey.

Air Corps Leads Revolution Break At Sanitago, Chile

Santiago, Chile, June 4 (AP)—Revolution broke out here today with the army air corps as its nucleus and Carlos Bavila, former ambassador to the United States, as one of the leaders.

Afoot and by air, officers and men of the air corps started on government house to overthrow President Juan Esteban Montero.

Planes flew low over the government building, but they dropped no bombs. Volunteer troops said to be 75,000 strong were organized rapidly to resist the attack.

PATTON NOMINATED DISTRICT ATTORNEY

Washington, June 4 (AP)—President Hoover today nominated Frank C. Patton, of North Carolina, to be United States attorney for the western district of North Carolina.

Greatest Army Of Voters In Any Primary In State Participates In Election

Vote In Today's Primary May Exceed 400,000 Total

Raleigh, June 4.—One of the heaviest votes ever cast in a Democratic primary is expected in today's election, with the result that returns are not expected to come in until late. With approximately 2,500 candidates running for office in the 100 counties and with more than the usual number of candidates seeking the nomination for the various State offices, a heavy vote is assured. Every candidate is going to do his utmost to get out as many votes as possible.

As a result of this situation, most of the observers here esti-

mate that the minimum vote cast today will be 350,000, while some estimates go as high as 500,000. Most of the old timers here agree that if the weather holds good throughout the day, from 350,000 to 400,000 votes will probably be cast. In the Democratic primary two years ago—1930—a total of 330,000 votes were cast, the largest primary vote ever recorded up to that time. But with the much larger number of candidates in this primary and with three candidates for the gubernatorial nomination and five candidates for the United States Senate, it is believed that the vote today will mount very close to 400,000 or even exceed it.

ALL SIGNS POINT TO EHRLINGHAUS AS PROBABLE LEADER

But Maxwell And Fountain Managers Do Not Concede Elizabeth City Man's Claims

FOUNTAIN HIGH MAN HIS FRIENDS CLAIM

But Contest for Governor Is Going To Be Close, and Maxwell May Be The Surprise of the Election; Vote Will Be Slow In Being Reported

Raleigh, June 4.—The largest army of voters North Carolina has probably ever seen marched to the polls today to select the Democratic nominee to be elected this fall, with indications that between 350,000 and 450,000 votes would be cast by sundown tonight, when the polls close. But in spite of the claims of the various candidates, their managers and friends, it is generally admitted that the contests for many of the nominations are very close, especially for the nomination for governor and the United States Senate.

According to all signs, portents and pre-primary indications, J. C. B. Ehringhaus is slated to be high man in the race for the gubernatorial nomination after the votes are counted tonight. Major L. P. McLendon, his campaign manager, maintains that on a minimum vote of 360,000 Ehringhaus will get approximately 185,000, R. T. Fountain about 85,000 and A. J. Maxwell about 80,000. He further maintains that the larger the vote, the larger will be the Ehringhaus plurality, because of the more universal support which he says Ehringhaus has.

But the more conservative Ehringhaus supporters are not able to wax as enthusiastic as Major McLendon, and on the basis of a vote of 350,000 votes cast, give Ehringhaus only

MARKETS CONTINUE ON UPWARD SWING

New York, June 4 (AP)—A buoyant bond market and a snappy rally in stocks today greeted the American Securities Investing Corporation, formed by a score of banking institutions under Morgan leadership to pick up investment bargains.

The advance in bonds virtually duplicated Friday's rise and many issues of all descriptions soared \$20 to more than \$70 per \$1,000 obligation. Preferred stocks also gathered strength, while common shares participated to the extent of \$1 to \$4.

Trading in both markets was active.

Ideal Weather Increases Voting In State Primary

Intense Interest Reported In Contests All Over North Carolina

Raleigh, June 4 (AP)—Ideal weather, intense interest in hundreds of local battles and speculation as to the result in the balloting for United States Senator and governor today took hundreds of thousands of North Carolinians to the polls in the biennial State primary.

Voting was on the heaviest Democratic State ticket since the primary law was adopted 17 years ago, and election officials generally predicted a record smashing vote of 350,000 or more.

The polls opened throughout the State at about 5 a. m. Eastern standard time, varying so as to conform to sunrise in each locality. They close at sundown.

In the city of Raleigh, one precinct, with its registration of 900, had voted 180 persons at 8:30 a. m., and the precinct officials estimated 700 votes would be counted there.

Early reports trickling into the capital from all over the State indicated a clear, sunny day was acting as an aid to election workers in turning out unprecedented thousands of ballot casters. Also it was indicated that the voting was being done unusually early in the day.

ANACONDA POOL IS FURTHER RELATED

Huge Paper Profits of Officials of That Company Told Committee

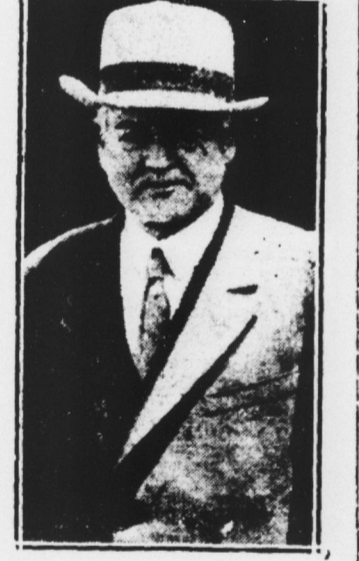
Washington, June 4 (AP)—Details of high finance, describing how officials of the Anaconda and other copper companies made huge paper profits through dealing in the stocks of their company, on which they had "inside information," were given today to the Senate Banking Committee.

The testimony included an account of a "wash sale" of the kind that is forbidden by stock exchange rules.

William A. Gray charged that John D. Ryan, chairman of Anaconda; Cornelius F. Kelly, president; H. F. Guggenheim, a large stockholder in the Chile Copper Company and the National City Company, made a "million and a quarter dollars" by buying up stock in the Chile company when they knew it would be converted into Anaconda stock.

Ryan on the stand, contended he had taken a "serious loss" because he is still holding Anaconda stock, and it has gone way down. Guggenheim sold his stock and made \$400,000, Gray said.

ADVERTISING NOW ON UPWARD TREND

New York Expert Believes It Forecasts Improvement In Business

New York, June 4 (AP)—Samuel W. Weston, expert on newspaper operations, said today that for the first time since 1929, advertising had shown a slight upward trend, and he expressed the opinion that this was a hopeful sign for forthcoming general improvement.

One reason expressed for this outlook was that in April classified advertising volume started distinctly upward, as compared with the first two months of the year.

"This has been followed in a lesser degree" by total advertising, he said. "If this index works in the future as it has in the past, it indicates there will be a slow but steady increase in total advertising volume."
