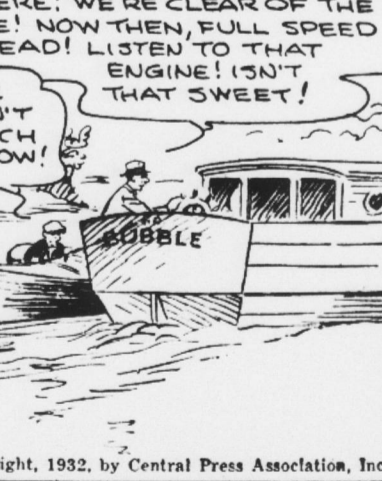

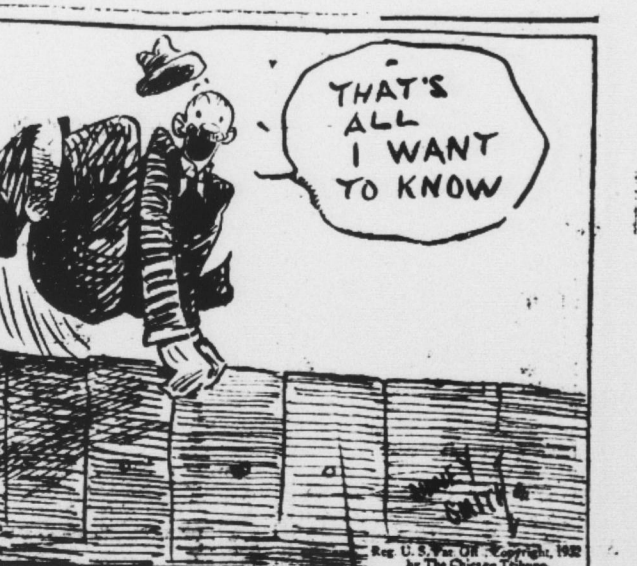

## FLETCHER FAVORED TO WIN TOMORROW

**Raleigh's Guess For Him As Between Two of Its Own Citizens**

Raleigh, July 1.—A close contest for the democratic nomination for commissioner of labor is in prospect tomorrow between Major A. L. Fletcher, who was high man in the first primary, and Clarence E. Mitchell who was in second place. Both of the candidates live in Raleigh.

Because Fletcher led in the first primary, many observers here are inclined to believe that he will be able to maintain his lead and win the nomination, since it is agreed in political circles that a plurality of any sort is of tremendous advantage in a second primary. Fletcher received 76,216 votes and Mitchell 74,820 in the first primary, giving Fletcher a lead of only 1,396 votes. Within the past few days, John Norton, who was one of the six candidates for the nomination in the first primary and who received 44,349 votes, has announced that he would support Fletcher in the second primary, while B. Fritz Smith, another one of the candidates, who received 22,180 votes in the first primary, has also come out for Fletcher. It is agreed, however, that there is no way of telling how those who voted for Norton and Smith will vote in the primary tomorrow.

On the other hand, friends of Mitchell point out that he may again spring a surprise, as he did in the first primary and walk away with the nomination. In the first primary it was generally agreed that the contest was between Fletcher and R. H. Lawrence, and that Mitchell could not do more than run third or fourth. But Mitchell surprised almost every one by winning in second place. It is also pointed out that Lawrence, who received 60,433 votes in the first primary has been actively supporting Mitchell in this second campaign, with the result that Mitchell may be able to overcome Fletcher's lead and emerge the nominee.
