Olympic Games Open Today In Los Angeles Big Stadium

Los Angeles, July 30 (AP)—Vice-president Charles Curtis lent the official dignity of the United States to the games of the tenth Olympiad yesterday arriving here to proclaim the opening of the international classic today.

He dismissed all talk of politics with a gesture and immediately launched into the spirit of the world-wide sports carnival which will take the spotlight with the opening ceremony on the packed Olympic stadium before 106,000 persons.

A 1,200 thousand piece band will play the national anthem, joined by a choir of 1,000 voices as the vice-pres-
