CURTIS, ACCEPTING NOMINATION, SLAPS REPEAL PROPOSALS

Opposed to Return of Saloon Or Repeal of Eighteenth Amendment, He Says In Address

MAKES NO MENTION OF HOOVER'S PLAN

G. O. P. Vice-Presidential Nominee Discusses Platform Planks, and Advocates Cooperatives To Help Farmers; Lauds Hoover's Relief Efforts

Opposed to return of saloon or repeal of eighteenth amendment, and expressing confidence in even full success of prohibition efforts to bring relief to the depression, Vice President Curtis today accepted renomination by the Republicans.

In his formal address of acceptance, said he felt the people should be given full opportunity to express their opinion on the constitution or amendments proposed but that personally "I am opposed to the return of the saloon and I am opposed to the repeal of the eighteenth amendment."

Mr. Curtis made no mention in his repeated address of President Hoover's proposal for a change in prohibition under which each State would be given the right to deal with the problem as it may determine, subject to Federal constitutional guarantees to protect them against interference by their neighbors and against return of the saloon system.

The Republican platform, he said, "emphasizes that the people should have the opportunity for expression of their opinion on the question of amendment to the Constitution and makes provision as to the Republicanism."

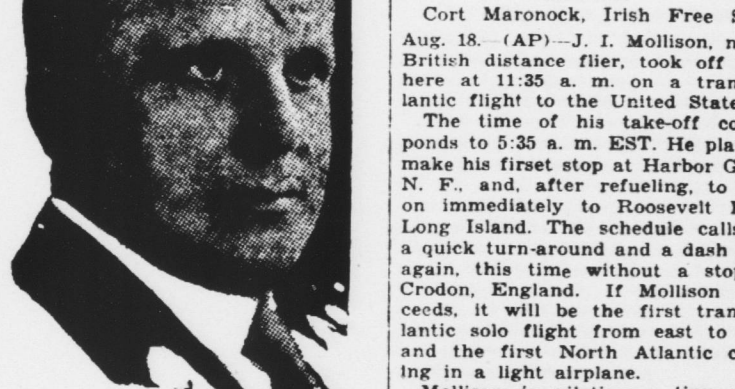
LINDBERGH TAKES TO AIR AGAIN

RELIEF FUND MUST GO OUT AS WAGES

Cannot Be Used As Direct Dole, Nor Can Equipment Be Bought

Raleigh, Aug. 18.—Either the State or local units, such as cities, counties and towns, may use relief funds obtained from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation through the general plan to pay wages to the needy for doing work either for the State or local units, but none of this money may be spent for materials or equipment, according to Dr. Fred W. Morrison, who has been appointed as relief director.
