

### Costs of School Audits Are Less Under New Plan

Daily Dispatch Bureau, In the Sir Walter Hotel, Raleigh, Aug. 23.—The cost of auditing county school funds has been reduced almost \$23,000 this past year compared with the cost in 1929, before the General Assembly decreed that no school fund audits should be made without first securing the approval of the Local Government Commission, figures secured today at the office of the commission show.

The cost of school fund audits in the various counties for the year ending June 30, 1932, was \$28,867, while for the year ending June 30, 1929, the cost of these audits to the counties was \$50,606. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1930, the cost of these school fund audits was \$38,604, a saving of \$12,000 the first year after the new law went into effect. For the year ending June 30, 1931, the cost was \$36,847.

The first law, enacted by the 1929 General Assembly upon the recommendation of the then County Government Advisory Commission, provided that before any county official or county agency, including the Board of Education, could have any audit made, it must first have a written contract and have it approved by the executive secretary of the County Government Commission. The 1931 General Assembly amended the act so that in addition to approving the contracts, the director of local government should also approve all bills for payment for services rendered by auditors.

Freshman Week Activities To Get Under Way September 19 With Good Prospects

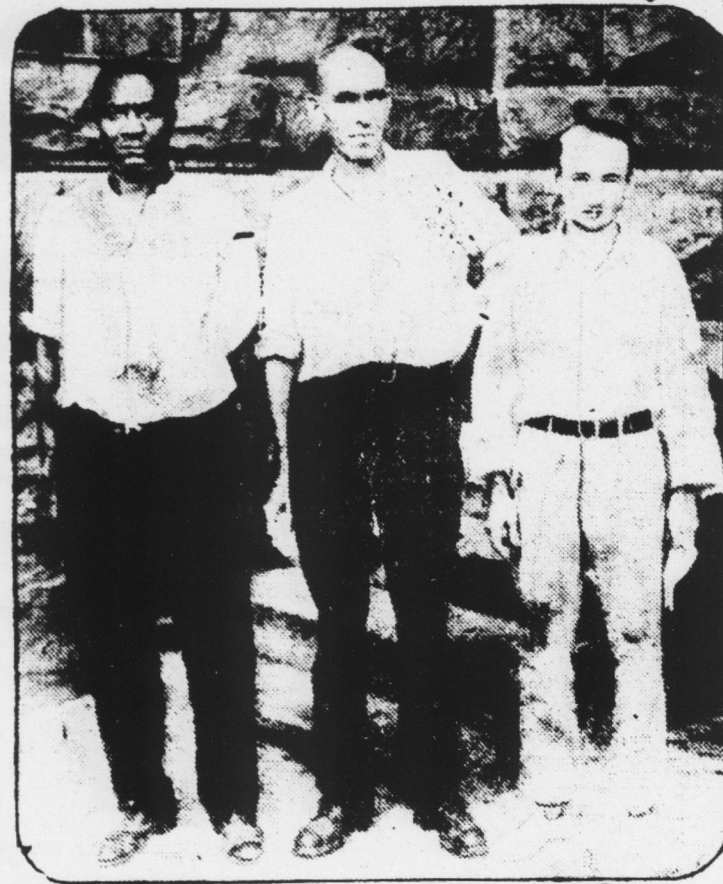
Chapel Hill, Aug. 23.—With indications pointing to a large enrollment, Monday, September 19, has been designated as the date for the arrival of the new men at the University of North Carolina this fall.

The annual Freshman Week activities, designed to orient the newcomers to University life, will get under way September 19 and continue through Wednesday, September 21, when the new men will register. Upperclassmen and graduate students will register Thursday, September 22, September 23.

Dr. T. J. Wilson, Jr., Dean of Admission, says it is a bit too early to make definite predictions as to enrollment. The freshman class will probably run between 700 and 800, and the number transferring from other institutions is unusually large.

### DAVIDSON MAN HAS DEPRESSION THEORY

Says Loss of Faith With Attendant Result of Fear is the Cause of Present Situation

Davidson, Aug. 23.—Loss of faith in one another and in the whole financial and social structure, with an attendant result of fear is the cause of the depression in the mind of Dr. Fraser Hood, Davidson College professor of psychology, according to an interview he gave recently to the Columbus, Ohio, Evening Enquirer. Dr. Hood is a member of the 1932 summer school faculty at Ohio State in Columbus and will broadcast over Station WEAO at 8:30 p. m. Friday night. The interview, as reported in

the Ohio paper, is as follows: The fear that causes depressions cannot be "pooh-poohed" away, but must be overcome by unearthing the causes of that fear and making the public face them, in the opinion of Fraser Hood, of Davidson College, visiting professor at Ohio State University during the summer term.

"There is all but unanimous belief that depressions derive from lack of confidence and that fear is at the bottom of lack of confidence, but to the economist fear is such an abstract term that it suggests no service to the man trying to devise a remedy," Hood explains.

"Psychologists, on the other hand, have studied fear and known a great deal about its causes and cures. In cases of individual fears, psychologists have been very successful in unearthing causes and proposing remedies. The same methods would be helpful in analyzing widespread social fears and suggesting palliatives which would lessen the severity of depressions."

### ATTENDING POWER HEARING IN RALEIGH

Mavor I. B. Watkins and his Attorney E. H. Perry were in Raleigh today attending the power rate hearing before the State Corporation Commission, in which the Carolina Power and Light Company's charges were under study, with a view, as the commission has stated, to effecting reductions if and where possible. ### PRODUCES WHEAT AT 30 CENTS A BUSHEL

Raleigh, Aug. 23.—(AP)—J. E. Stimpson, of Route 1, Raleigh, produced a crop of wheat this spring at a cost of only 30 cents a bushel, County Agent J. C. Anderson reports.

Each item of cost, including fertilizer, seed, and planting and harvesting, was figured in the records kept on the crop. While the yield was low as compared with the state average, the low cost of production made it a profitable crop and Mr. Stimpson plans to increase his wheat acreage this fall, Anderson said.

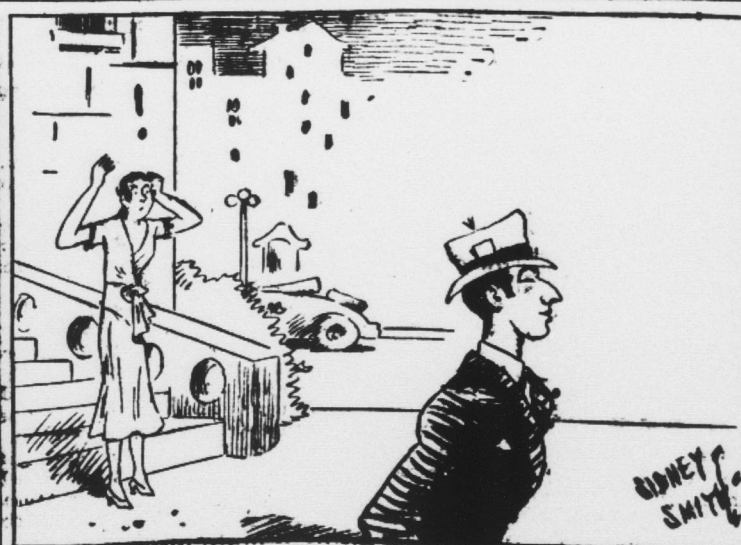
