GEORGE A. YOUNCE GOES ON TRIAL ON PERJURY CHARGES

Former Solicitor Denies Motion To Quash Warrant Or Strike Out Some of Allegations

SELECTION OF JURY BEGUN IMMEDIATELY

Judge Harding Presiding Over Case Growing Out of Conflicting Statements in Connection With Fatal Shooting of Sheriff Leonard of Davidson County

Lexington, Aug. 24.—(AP)—George A. Younce, former solicitor of this district, went on trial in Davidson County Superior Court this morning on a charge of perjury growing out of his testimony in a coroner's inquest into the death of Sheriff James A. Leonard, for whose slaying Younce was acquitted.

When the case was called, J. C. Smith, of Greensboro, counsel for Younce, made a motion to quash the warrant, or have some of its allegations stricken out, but Judge W. F. Harding overruled the motion and ordered the selection of the jury to begin.

SALES TAX SEEMS INEVITABLE DURING 1933 LEGISLATURE

Those Who Have Analyzed Membership of Next General Assembly Reach Conclusion

GENERAL SALES TAX APPEARS PROBABLE

Fight To Be Concentrated on Senate, Where Sales Tax Was Blocked Last Year; Probable Partial Line-Up of Some Senators Is Guessed At

Daily Dispatch Bureau, Raleigh, Aug. 24.—The enactment of a sales tax of some sort—either general or so-called luxury, if not both—is regarded as almost inevitable when the 1933 General Assembly meets here in January, according to those who have been studying the lists of those who will probably be in the House and Senate.

Indications are that a major effort will be made by the sales tax advocates to enact a general sales tax rather than a so-called luxury sales tax and that this effort will be centered in the Senate instead of in the House, according to those who have been studying the lay-out and observations.

MAY ABOLISH CASH DISCOUNT ON GAS

Sept. 1 Date Rumored For Increase; Investigation May Be Cause

Daily Dispatch Bureau, Raleigh, Aug. 24.—All the gasoline companies that have been selling gasoline for two cents a gallon less than the posted price for cash, will abolish this two cents discount September 1, it was learned from reliable sources here today. This will be equivalent to an increase of two cents a gallon in most sections of the State and increase the retail filling station price to from 22 to 24 cents a gallon. It is also pointed out that the retail price was steadily boosted for several months before the two cents a gallon cash discount was announced.
