### Cloudy Weather Menaces Plans For Observing Sun In Eclipse In Northeast

Path Across New England Crowded, However, With Scientists To Watch The Phenomenon

#### 43 EXPEDITIONS ON HAND AS OBSERVERS

Weather Man Worrying Astronomers, But 30 Aviators Wait To Take Scientists Above Clouds for Tests As to Sun's Rays During The Eclipse

The solar system free show is about to begin and the path "midway of the west" that runs across New England is crowded with scientists and laymen.  
The instruments of 43 expeditions in place and last minute adjustments have been made.  
The weather man who is worrying the astronomers, he predicted "partly cloudy" for Massachusetts and states where the paths of scientific chances are located for a part of Massachusetts, a part of which lies in the total eclipse, the prediction is "fair and warm." Thirty aviators stood by the home-made belt ready to rise to heights above the clouds in case or cloud should intervene.

#### Smith Seat In Senate Contested

#### South Carolinian Is Battling for Fifth Term; McAdoo In California

Washington, S. C., Aug. 30.—(AP)—A surprising enrollment of Democrats nominated a candidate for Congress today and chose McAdoo for six congressional seats and four lesser offices.  
McAdoo, figured largely in the election race, in which Senator Ellison S. Smith is seeking his fifth term against three opponents. The Democratic ticket, Blewett, former senator and former governor, is one of them. The other are Ashton H. Williams, of Pennsylvania, and Leon W. Harris, of Alabama.

#### McAdoo's Fortunes Are At Stake In California

San Francisco, Aug. 30.—(AP)—The fortunes of William G. McAdoo, general of the Democratic ticket on the west coast, and of Senator Samuel Hays, Republican, and friends of the administration were at stake in a primary election today.

### Further Rise In Textiles Is Seen

New York, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Hope for further increase is seen in buoyancy of the textiles and commodity markets. Some of these markets have climbed more than 90 percent above their depression lows.  
Spit cotton and woolen mills in New England report a rush of orders. A large number of employees have been recalled, and in several instances operation schedules have been put on 24 hour basis.

#### Stand on Prohibition Won't Hurt Him; Belief Is His Wetness Was Small Consideration In His Successful Campaign Against Senator Morrison

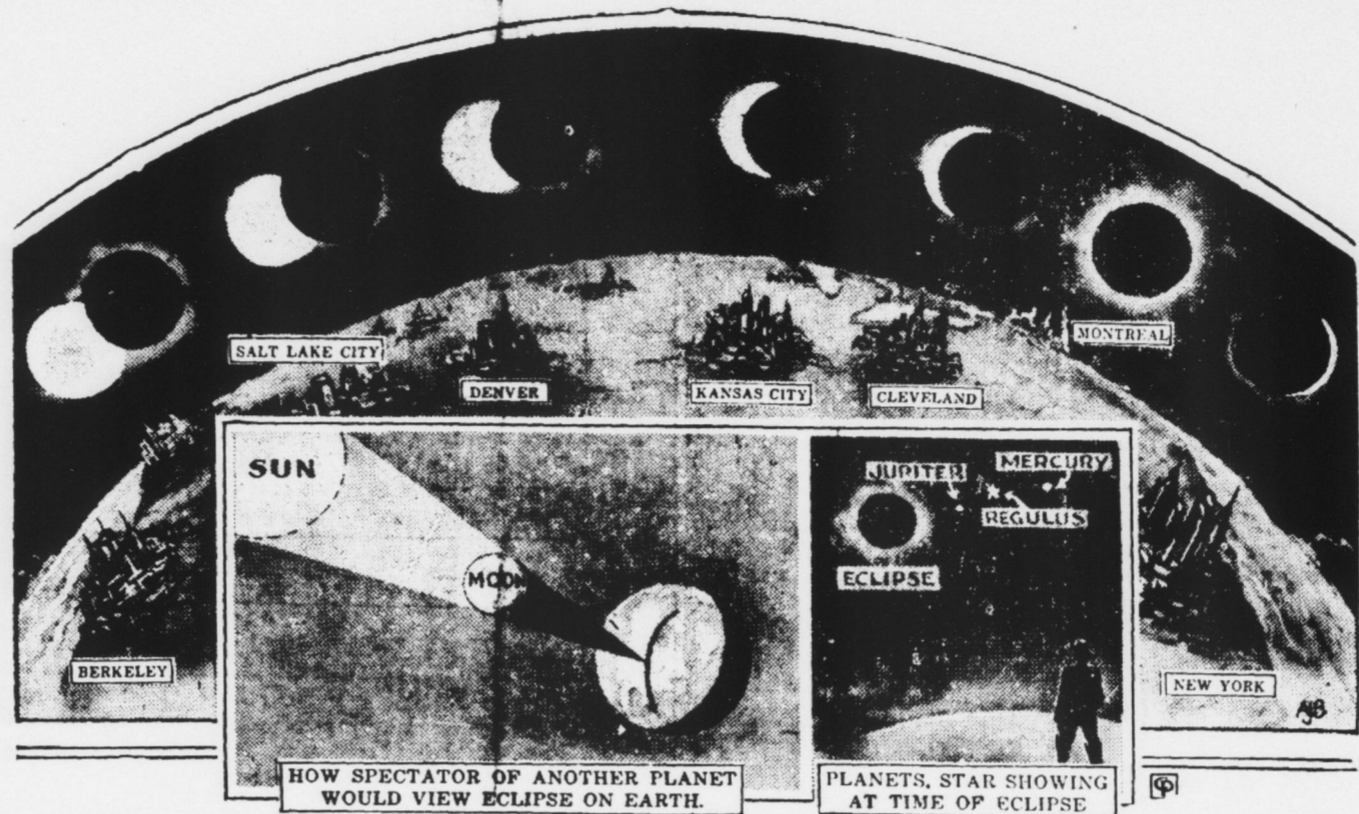
Daily Dispatch Bureau, in the Sir Walter Hotel, Raleigh, Aug. 30.—In spite of the few "dry" Democrats in the State who are more devoted to the cause of prohibition than to the Democratic party and a few others who personally do not have much liking for Robert B. Reynolds, the Democratic nominee for United States Senator, the bulk of the political belief here is that Reynolds will have very little difficulty in being elected this fall. In fact a great many here, including a number of those who supported Senator Cameron Morrison through both primaries, are of the opinion that Reynolds will come out victorious.

#### LaRoque Boosted As State Manager Of New Loan Bank

Daily Dispatch Bureau, in the Sir Walter Hotel, Raleigh, Aug. 30.—O. K. LaRoque, deputy commissioner of insurance in charge of building and loan supervision in North Carolina, is being prominently mentioned for the post of manager of the new district Federal Home Loan Bank that will be located in Winston-Salem. Those here who know LaRoque and the large part he had in securing the enactment of the home loan bank bill are confident that he has an excellent chance to be named manager of this bank and that he will probably get the post.  
Since a large part of the business of the district bank will be done with building and loan associations, and because LaRoque is probably more familiar with the management of building and loan associations than any other man in North Carolina, he would be eminently fitted for the position of manager of this bank, according to opinion here. LaRoque has also had wide experience in all branches of banking formerly having been a Federal bank examiner, so that he had adequate background should he be selected as manager of the home loan bank in this district.

### Roosevelt Can Oust Mr. Walker

Albany, N. Y., Aug. 30.—(AP)—The right of Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt to remove Mayor James J. Walker from office has been established by a court decision.  
Supreme Court Justice Ellis J. Starbuck ruled last night that the governor had the authority to remove the mayor, and in conducting the hearing he was not bound by the court to adhere to any rule of judicial procedure.

### SILENCE SHROUDS POLICY ON COTTON

#### Jesse Jones Said \$50,000,000 Available To Hold Cotton Off

Washington, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Silence today surrounded the \$50,000,000 which Jesse H. Jones, a director of the Reconstruction Corporation, said last night had been made available to keep government-controlled cotton off the market until 1933.  
Farm board officials declined to discuss the proposed loan in any way, but it was strongly indicated there that the board and the reconstruction Corporation would not pull agreements concerning the loans.

### NINE DEFENDANTS STILL BEING TRIED

#### Charged With Conspiracy to Defraud In Elections; State May Rest

North Wilkesboro, Aug. 30 (AP)—The trial of nine defendants charged with conspiracy to defraud in the 1930 general elections in Watauga county continued here today and court attaches said they believed the case would rest late today.  
The nine on trial today are residents of Cove Creek, in which precinct they are charged with exchanging Republican ballots for Democratic ones during the mounting of votes.  
Yesterday eight defendants from the Laurel Creek precinct charged similarly as the nine on trial today, were acquitted.

### PATROL IS LEGALLY IN STRIKE REGIONS

#### No Violation of Law For Them At Thomasville And Rockingham

#### REGULATING TRAFFIC

#### They Are In No Sense Guarding Mills or Bothing Strikers; Gardner Using Them Instead of Soldiers

Daily Dispatch Bureau, in the Sir Walter Hotel, Raleigh, Aug. 30.—The concentration of numbers of State Highway patrolmen at Thomasville and Rockingham as the result of strikes there among textile and furniture workers, is in no way a violation of the law creating the State Highway Patrol, but rather in direct line of its duty, according to those here who have been studying the statute. So far the patrolmen have been ordered only to keep the highways open, enforce the motor vehicle and highway laws and keep the peace, which is their duty as set forth in the 1931 statute governing the conduct of the State Highway Patrol.  
Since the members of the highway patrol are commissioned individually by the governor from the captain on down, and since the governor is the State's highest law enforcement officer, there is no doubt but that the governor has the power to command the patrol and assign it to any duty necessary to keep the peace, most of those consulted here agree.  
"If the governor has the power to call out the National Guard and assign it to police and law enforcement duty, he undoubtedly has the power to

### SAYS DRY FORCES FAR FROM BEATEN IN UNITED STATES

### OVER ONE THOUSAND AT FARMER'S MEET

#### 30th Annual Convention Gets Under Way in Raleigh; Warren Watson Speaks

Raleigh, Aug. 30 (AP)—More than 1,000 persons packed Pullen hall at North Carolina State College today for the opening session of the 30th annual State Farmers and Farm Women's Convention.  
W. Warren Watson, of Hyde county, president of the State Farmers Federation, asserted in his address that farmers "are optimists and are looking to several agencies during the coming year which can bring relief."  
He listed prospects of better markets for products, Federal and State employment relief, and possibly tax relief by the 1933 general assembly.

### Mrs. Ferguson Is Now Again Ahead

Dallas, Texas, Aug. 30 (AP)—Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson's lead over Governor R. S. Sterling in the Democratic gubernatorial race was increased to 1,297 votes on the second compilation of votes made today by the Texas Elections Bureau.  
The returns from all 251 counties, 224 complete, gave Ferguson 474,530 and Sterling 473,233.  
It was estimated by the election bureau that approximately 3,000 votes were yet to be counted.

### TROPIC STORM IS MOVING INTO GULF

#### Passing Across Florida With Comparatively Little Damage There

#### HEAVY RAIN FALLS

#### Winds on Lower East Coast Also High Velocity; Telephone Communication to Some Sections Disrupted

Miami, Aug. 30.—(AP)—The tropical disturbance that blew in from the Atlantic last night bringing heavy rains and winds to the lower east coast, swept westward today across partly inhabited swamps of the Everglades toward the Gulf of Mexico.  
Richard W. Gray, government weather man here, said the storm was central this morning between Fort Myers and Key West and would pass into the Gulf if it continued its present course.

Disruption of telephone communication to Everglades and Naples, on the southern coast, prevented an accurate chart of the progress of the storm that caused only slight damage on the eastern shore of the peninsula.  
Reports from Everglades indicated that no damage had been caused to the rich farming section that fringes the eastern shore of Lake Okeechobee.

### Farmers Picket Line Collapses With "Big Push"

Des Moines, Iowa, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Farm produce was brought unhindered into Des Moines today with the collapse of the last strong farmers holiday picket line.  
Shortly before noon Sheriff Carl Koelling, a force of deputies and truck drivers, all armed with clubs massed on highway 65 north of the city, and forced their way through members of the farmers holiday association, who seek to force higher agricultural prices by keeping produce from the market.  
The "big push" against the blockade, after starting at a point five miles from Ames, resulted in the free movement of produce into this capital city.

### AGING PRESIDENT GETS FINAL WORD IN FIXING POLICIES

#### Apparently No Combination of Opposition Parties Is Able To Block Government

### IMPEACHMENT FOR LEADERS IS ASKED

#### 75 Year Old "Grandmother of the Revolution," Demands as Communist the Ousting of Hindenburg and Chancellor von Papen Under Constitution

Berlin, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler's National Socialists won their first important office in the National government today with the election of Herman Wilhelm Goerring as president of the new Reichstag.  
Goerring has been with Hitler since 1923. He served his country during the war, and was cited for valor as commander of the famous Von Richthofen flying squadron. His margin of victory was 567 votes to 216.

### IMPEACHMENT IS ASKED FOR GOVERNMENT HEADS

Berlin, Aug. 30.—(AP)—The impeachment of President von Hindenburg and the cabinet of Chancellor Franz von Papen on charges that they had violated the constitution was demanded today by Clara Zetkin, 75-year-old "grandmother of the German revolution," and a communist leader, when in the capacity of senior member, she opened the first session of the new Reichstag.  
The president, in a statement issued three hours before the Reichstag assembled, announced his complete accord with the government program, and said that he was ready to issue the emergency decree to put the plan in operation.

By this decision the Reichstag was called in event that disapproval of the cabinet course will mean dissolution. Once more it appeared that the aging field marshal had said the last word and that no combination of opposition parties could turn the government from its path.

### Cotton Recovers Large Portion Of Its Early Losses

New Orleans, Aug. 30.—(AP)—The cotton market, made vulnerable by spectacular steady gains last week, weakened under a wave of profit-taking in trade today and lost more than \$2 a bale net, before short covering was satisfied.  
Fluctuating feverishly, and active trading of October declined to 8.71; December to 8.75, about \$2.00 a bale below yesterday's close, and nearly \$4 a bale under the new season high established in yesterday's session.

Before the end of the first hour, however, futures rallied about \$1 a bale from the lowest when short covering and traders showed apprehension over the approach of the tropical storm.

### Gardner Is To Select New Judge

#### Prominent Western Lawyers Talked As Successor to Judge MacRae

Raleigh, Aug. 30.—(AP)—A successor to special Judge Cameron F. MacRae, who died suddenly at Fayetteville Sunday, probably will be named this week by Governor O. Max Gardner. It was authoritatively learned here today.

Governor Gardner is now on his vacation at his home in Shelby, and his offices here said nothing was known about the matter.  
A score or more of prominent western attorneys have been proposed to the governor to fill the vacancy. It was learned, with Sam J. Ervin, Jr., of Morganton, a member of the last General Assembly, and F. S. Hill, of Murphy, understood to be the most seriously considered.  
Funeral services for Judge MacRae were held today at Fayetteville.
