SOCIALISTS IGNORE DISSOLUTION EDICT

Chancellor's Decree Comes After Vote, and Reichstag Head Holds Government Has Already Been Overthrown; Government May Employ Force

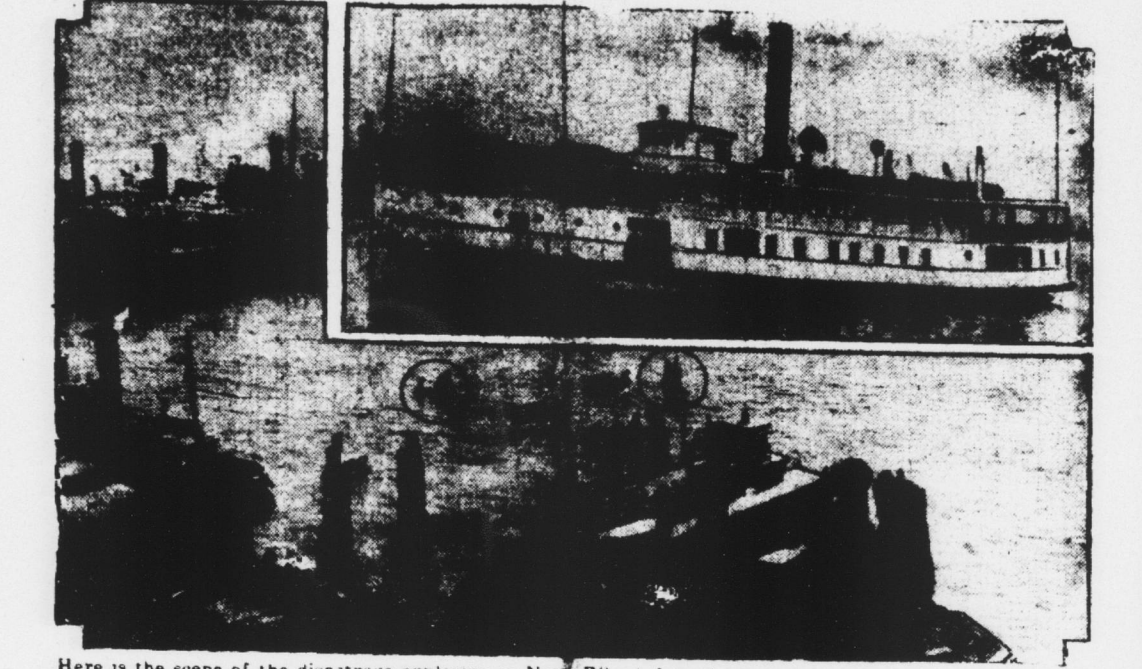
Sept. 12 (AP)—A Communist motion of non-confidence in the cabinet of Chancellor Franz von Papen was voted by the Reichstag today 513 to 32 with 50 members absent.

Here is the scene of the disastrous explosion in New York's East River, where the steamer "Observation" was virtually blown to matchwood. The number of known dead is expected to reach 40, besides nearly a hundred injured. The craft, once used as a sight-seeing steamer was ferrying a party of workmen to Riker's Island, where they were employed on construction work on the new penitentiary.
