

Washington, Sept. 14 (AP) -Eight weeks of renewed and more intense campaigning was today's Republican program after Democratic success in Maine.

Curtis said: "We are greatly disappointed; it will only make us work harder and we will carry the state in November." Mr. Hoover's views on the election in which a Democrat was elected for the first time in 18 years was given to Chairman Sanders, of the Repub-

lican national committee. These statements were made public at the White House after extended conferences between President Hoover and Secretary Mills and Postmaster General Brown, who later joined in predicting a high speed campaign for the next two months.
