COLOMBIAN MOB OF 10,000 DEMANDING WAR AGAINST PERU

Go Down Into Their Pocket, book and Jewel Cases To Provide Money To Finance It \$10,000,000 CREDIT IS PASSED BY SENATE

Action Follows Report Of Seizure by Peruvian Citizens of Colombian Fort on Amazon River; Merely Regional Affair, Peruvians Explain

Lima, Colombia, Sept. 19.—(AP)—Thousands of Colombians clamored for war with Peru and went down into their pocketbooks and their purses to provide funds to finance the war.

The senate passed a bill authorizing the government to arrange a credit of \$10,000,000 for national defense.

The action followed a report of the seizure of September 1 by Peruvian citizens of the Colombian fort of Iquitos on the Amazon river.

The fort was ceded to Colombia in the 1920 treaty with Peru in which the Peruvian government promised Colombia that as far as it was concerned Peruvian soldiers were in the region for the purpose of the milling which filled the streets here.

Washington, Sept. 19.—(AP)—The Reconstruction Finance Corporation today loaned Virginia \$283,367 to meet emergency relief needs in Halifax, Pulaski and Wise counties.

Franchises Sought By Bus Lines Corporation Commission to Have Hearings Tomorrow On Petitions Made

Wilmington, Sept. 19.—(AP)—The State Corporation Commission tomorrow will hold a number of hearings relative to bus company franchises.

The Carolina Rapid Transit Company of Charlotte, will ask the group to grant it a franchise to operate a virtually all-night express service.

The P. and F. Motor Transit Company of Wilmington is seeking permission to extend its lines from Hamlet to Charlotte, and H. Kirk and Company of Wilmington is asking an extension from Fayetteville to Warsaw.

W. W. Miller Motor Express, operating from Atlanta, Ga., to Fayetteville, is requesting truck franchise rights from Fayetteville to Wilmington.

Thomasville-High Point Groups Go Back To Work

Strikers Go Back To Jobs on Terms Made at Conference With Governor on Saturday

SOME STILL IDLE FOR TIME, HOWEVER High Point Silk Mill Officials Say All Will Be Taken Back Soon as Orders Justify It; Only Day Shift Is Working In High Point So Far

High Point, Sept. 19.—(AP)—Approximately 700 strikers went back to work here and at Thomasville, near here, today, working at lengthy time but leaving, at the same time, some 500 workmen still idle.

Officials of the Stehli silk mills here and the Thomasville Chair Company, at Thomasville, announced their plants would reopen today, following conferences Saturday with Governor Gardner.

STRIKERS RETURN TO WORK AT THOMASVILLE, Sept. 19.—(AP)—A total of 677 idle operators of the Thomasville Company ended their three-week-old strike today and returned to work, while 100 others prepared to follow their footsteps tomorrow.

The strike here broke up today following conferences over the week-end with Governor Gardner, mill officials and strikers' representatives.
