DAVIS UNABLE TO GET INTO PRISON

Anxious To Start Serving His Term, But Red Tape Delays Him

Daily Dispatch Bureau, In the St. Walter Hotel, Raleigh, Oct. 26.—Although Wallace B. Davis, former president of the Central Bank and Trust Company of Asheville, is in Raleigh and anxious to start serving his sentence of five to seven years in the State Prison here, he cannot enter the prison yet and may have to wait a week or at least several days before the prison will admit him. Davis was convicted on several counts in connection with the failure of his bank there in 1930 and sentenced from five to seven years. This sentence is entirely separate and apart from the sentence of four to six years imposed upon him in his conviction with Luke Lea and Luke Lea, Jr. of Tennessee, this

latter sentence to run concurrently with the other sentence.

Davis came here yesterday to give himself up and start serving his sentence at the State Prison. But it was found on his arrival that the record and sentence in the case had not yet been certified down to the clerk of court in Buncombe county, as must be done. For the clerk of court must receive a certified copy of the judgment of the State Supreme Court in a case that has been appealed, before he can issue commitment papers for any prisoner.

The judgment was ready to be certified to the Buncombe county clerk of court last night and probably will be sent to him today. But at most several days will be required before the commitment papers can be made out and sent to Davis, who intends to remain here until they are received.

General Albert L. Cox, counsel for Davis, said today that there is little chance for these papers to be received until Friday or even later.

Several days ago another western North Carolina banker, J. Mack Rhodes, of Hendersonville, arrived at the State Prison here to give himself up and start serving his sentence, imposed in connection with the failure of a Hendersonville bank. But he did not have commitment papers and the prison refused to take him. Now he and Davis are both awaiting the proper papers to admit them to prison.

and convert the rear axles into "Hoover Carts" of one mule power.

While the high cost of operating an automobile has not been the only factor in bringing about a steadily decreasing registration of automobiles in North Carolina, it has undoubtedly been a large contributing factor, Mr. Allen said. The decreased registration has brought about a decided decrease in the sale of gasoline, oil, tires and other accessories. It is because of this that this organization is being formed in an effort to lighten the tax load of the automobile owners, Mr. Allen said.

Other objectives of the association are vigorous opposition to any diversion of any part of the gasoline tax for anything other than highway maintenance and construction and the enactment of legislation to put a stop to any gasoline tax evasion by distributors or filling station operators.

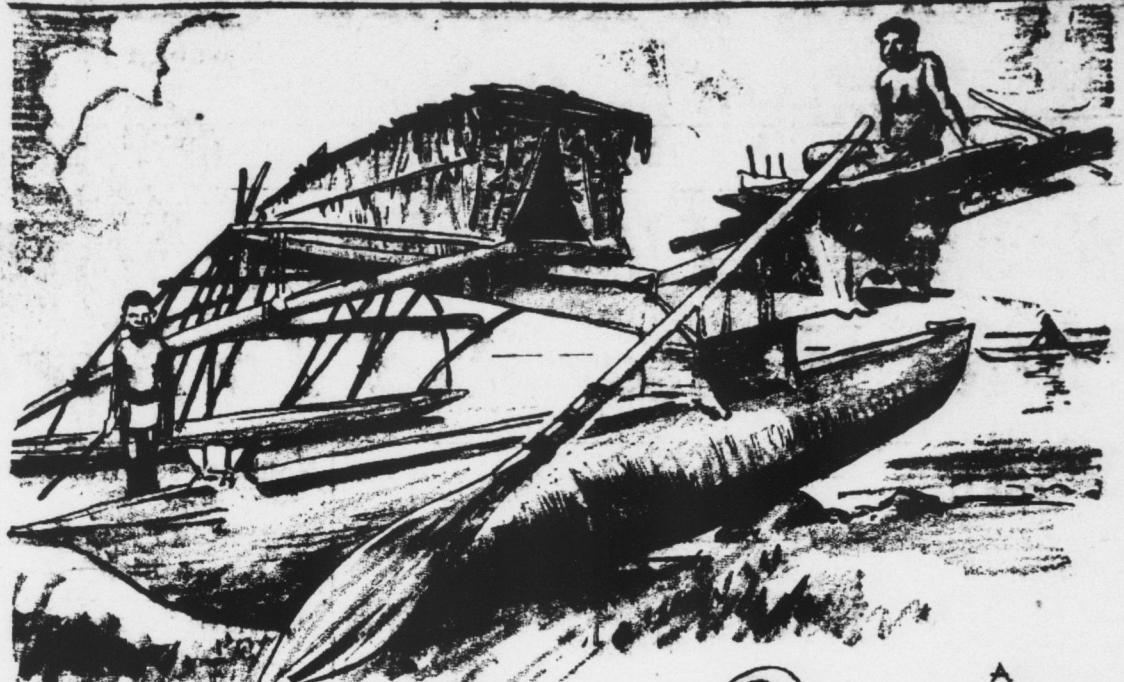
