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# ROOSEVELT WINS!

## North Carolina Goes Democratic By Majority Of About 250,000

### Ehringhaus Leads Frazier More Than 200,000 Majority

Roosevelt Has Nearly 250,000 Plurality Over Hoover In North Carolina Returns

MOST OF PRECINCTS IN STATE REPORTED

Reynolds Well Over 200,000 Ahead of Newell; Other Democratic Candidates For State Offices Match Head of the Ticket on Available Returns

Nov. 9.—(AP)—The Democratic party maintained its overwhelming lead as late returns were counted today from yesterday's election.

Complete unofficial returns gave Franklin D. Roosevelt a plurality of 248,000 in round figures, over President Hoover, and similar majorities were indicated for other Democratic candidates.

With 135 of the State's voting precincts reported, the standing was: Roosevelt, 336,886; Hoover, 132,658; Norman Thomas, Socialist, 3,216; William D. Upshaw, Prohibition party, 2; William Z. Foster, Communist, 2; Robert R. Reynolds, of Asheville, Republican candidate, held to a 200,000 over his dry Republican opponent, Jake F. Newell, of Charlotte.

The vote from 1,178 precincts was: Reynolds, 333,900; Newell, 124,169.

Governor, J. C. B. Ehringhaus, Democrat of Elizabeth City, ran against Clifford Frazier, Republican, by the same record-breaking figures. The vote with 1,217 precincts reported was: Ehringhaus, 351,905; Frazier, 118,752.

Other Democratic candidates for State offices matched the head of the ticket stride for stride, on the face of available returns.

Twenty-two of 151 precincts gave for Congress in the fourth district: Frazier, 205,135; Dixon, Republican, 5,135.

### 25 Persons Dead When Heavy Storm Strikes In Cuba

Havana, Cuba, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Twenty-five persons were killed, many were injured, and a number of houses were destroyed today as a heavy storm struck the eastern Cuban provinces of Santa Clara and Ciego de Avila.

These casualties estimates were reported to the department of communications from the storm area.

National police in Camajuani reported to the secretary of the interior that they were providing first aid, but that they had been unable to make an official estimate of the dead.

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### Farmer Shot Dead At Princeton Near A Voting Precinct

Princeton, Nov. 8.—(AP)—David Price, 31, farmer, was shot to death on the streets here last night and Irby Holt, 22-year-old farmer, was being held in jail today pending a coroner's inquest Friday night.

Police could not find witnesses to the shooting nor could they learn what led to the shooting. Holt was lodged in jail at Smithfield, where the inquest will be held.

The shooting occurred a short distance from a voting precinct. An officer said he was in a cafe near by at the time and heard several shots. He dashed out to find two shots were fired at Price and several more by another officer as a man fled up an alley.

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### A New Leader To Take The Wheel



FRANKLIN DELANO ROOSEVELT JOHN NANCE GARNER



Born on family estate at Hyde Park, N. Y., on Jan. 30, 1882, the son of a wealthy vice-president of the Delaware & Hudson Railway, whose ancestors had immigrated from Holland to New Amsterdam about 1635.

Born in a log house in Red River County, Texas, Nov. 22, 1869, the son of a farmer whose parents had moved from Tennessee to a Texas homestead in 1842, bringing their six small children in a covered wagon.

### EARLY LIFE AND EDUCATION

Grew up amid wealth, and had private tutors. Attended Groton, a private school for boys, and later Harvard and Columbia University Law School. Admitted to bar in 1907 at age of 25.

### POLITICAL EXPERIENCE

Elected to state senate of New York in 1910; appointed assistant secretary of Navy by President Wilson in 1913; was Democratic candidate for vice-presidency in 1920; elected governor of New York in 1928 and re-elected to that office in 1930.

### THE MAN AND HIS FAMILY

Married Anna Eleanor Roosevelt, a niece of Theodore Roosevelt (his own sixth cousin), in 1905; has four sons and one daughter, all grown. Stricken with infantile paralysis in 1921, which crippled his limbs, and has won brave uphill fight. His hobbies are swimming and collecting postage stamps.

Married Etta Rheiner of Uvalde in 1895, though she had opposed his appointment as judge a few years before. She has been his secretary ever since. They have one son, Tully Garner, an attorney, and live modestly in medium-priced Washington hotel. His hobby is fishing.

Walked three miles to school, studied law as cowboy, spent one year in Vanderbilt University and continued his study in law office at Clarksville, Tex. Admitted to bar in 1890 at the age of 21.

Appointed to county judgeship at Uvalde, Tex., in 1892; elected for second term but defeated for third term elected to state legislature in 1896 and re-elected in 1900 elected to Congress in 1902 and has been since re-elected 14 times, becoming speaker of Congress in 1931.

### HUGE INCREASE IN 1932 COTTON CROP

### Roosevelt's Total 472 To Hoover's 59 In Electoral Votes

### DEMOCRATS LEAD IN NEARLY EVERY PART OF COUNTRY

### Roosevelt Is Elected by Unprecedented Vote, With Heavy Majorities In Congress

### EMPHATIC REVERSE OF 1928 ELECTION

### State After State Hitherto Regarded Unshakably Republican Tumbles Into Democratic Column; Hoover Quick To Congratulate Opponent

(By the Associated Press.) A mighty Democratic tornado whipped across the country in Tuesday's voting. It tore relentlessly into every section of the nation, elected Franklin D. Roosevelt to the presidency, assured him a strongly Democratic Congress and brought success to a multitude of his party's State and local office-seekers.

In the hands of the Republicans it left a scant handful of New England and eastern states, and upon New York's governor it conferred an electoral vote that from all indications today will surpass the record of 444 established when Herbert Hoover was elevated to the nation's highest office.
