Farmer Shot Dead At Princeton Near A Voting Precinct

Princeton, Nov. 8 .- (AP) -- David Price, 31, farmer, was shot to death on the streets here last night and Irby Holt. 22 year-old farmer, was being 'held in jail today pending a coroner's

inquest Friday night.
Police could not find witnesses to the shooting nor could they learn what evtn led to the shooting. Holt was lodged in jail at Smithfield, where the inquest will be held.

Born on family estate at Hyde Park, N. Y., on Jan. 30, 1882, the son of a wealthy vice-president of the Delaware & Hudson Railway, whose ancestors had immigrated from Holland to New Amsterdam about 1636.

Born in a log house in Red River County, Texas, Nov 22, 1869, the son of a farmer whose paren's had moved from Tennessee to a Texas homestead in 1842, bringing their six small children in a covered wagon.

EARLY LIFE AND EDUCATION

Grew up amid wealth, and had private tutors. Attend-Present Administration Has ed Groton, a private school for boys, and later Harvard and Columbia University Law School. Admitted to bar in 1907 at age of 25.

Walked three miles to school, studied law as cowboy, spent one year in Vanderbilt University and continued his study in law office at Clarksville, Tex. Admitted to bar in 1890 at the age of 21.

Appointed to county judgeship at Uvalde, Tex., in 1892;

elected to Congress in 1902 and has been since re-elected-

cd 14 times, becoming speaker of Congress in 1931.

POLITICAL EXPERIENCE

Elected to state senate of New York in 1910; appointed assistant secretary of Navy by President Wilson in 1913; was Democratic candidate for vice-presidency in 1920; elected governor of New York in 1928 and re-elected to that office in 1930.

THE MAN AND HIS FAMILY

Roosevelt (his own sixth cousin), in 1905; has four sons Economies, Deficit Has and one daughter, all grown. Stricken with infantile paralysis in 1921, which crippled his limbs, and has won brave uphill fight. His hobbies are swimming and collecting postage stamps.

Married Ettie Rheiner of Uvalde in 1895, though she had opposed his appointment as judge a few years before. She has been his secretary ver since. They have one son, Tully Garner, an attorney, and live modestly in medium-priced Washington hotel. His hobby is fishing.

In Senate Democratic Strength Will Be Increased by 25; McAdoo Wins Easily In California Contest; Nine Republican States Elect Democrats

Washington, Nov. 9 .- (AP) -- Mowing down their opponents on many fronts, the Democrats today were in complete control of the 73rd Congress The tidal wave that swept Franklin D. Roosevelt into the President's chair also gave him a Democratic dominated assembly with which to work with.

Stalwart Senate leaders were downed to give the Democrats seats neces sary to place them in command of that

The bare majority by which the Democrats held the present House was wollen by more than a score of tories in Republican territory and incomplete returns from many districts, indicating a possible Democratic majority of between 50 and 100.

Four Republican Senators-Dale, of Pennsylvania, were re-elected; Nye was leading in North Dakota. Colorful figures in both branches

went down in defeat. Senators Smoot, of Utah; Watson, of Indiana; Moses, of New Hampshire; of Illinois, were among the Repub-lican casualties. Representative La-Guardia and Ruth Baker Pratt both Democrats had won 25, and were leading in other States. William Gibbe

DEMOCRATS LEAD IN NEARLY EVERY PART OF COUNTRY

Roosevelt Is Elected by Unprecedented Vote, With Heavy Majorities In Congress

EMPHATIC REVERSE OF 1928 ELECTION

State After State Hitherto Regarded Unshakeably Republican Tumbles Into Democratic Column: Hoover Quick To Congratulate Opponent

(By the Associated Press.) A mighty Democratic tornado whipped across the country in Tuesday's voting. It tore relentlessly into every ection of the nation, elected Franklin D. Roosevelt to the presidency. assured him a strongly Democratic Con gress and brought success to a multitude of his party's State and loca office-seekers.

In the hands of the Republicans it left a scant handful of New England and eastern states, and upon New York's governor it conferred an electoral vote that from all indications today will surpass the record of 444 established when Herbert Hoover was elevated to the nation's highest office
