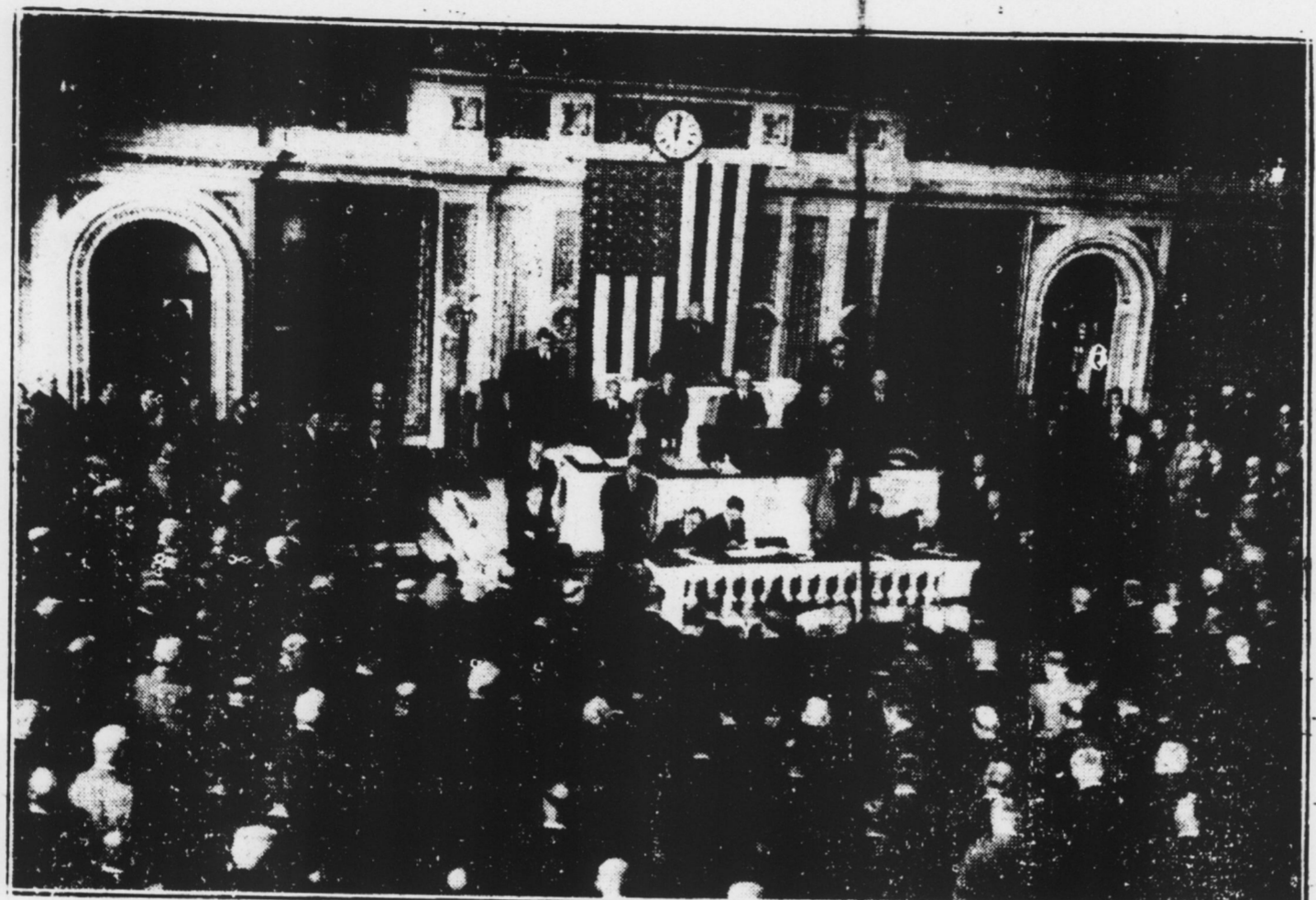
The plans of the president-elect were disclosed today shortly before he left Washington for a 15-minute stop before speeding on to New York.

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Brewers, Pleading Cause, Promise Everything Good

Would Bring Treasury \$330,000,000 Revenue, Furnish 300,000 Men Jobs and Release \$360,000,000 In Rehabilitation of Breweries Throughout Country

Washington, Dec. 7. (AP)—Witnesses for brewers depicted beer as a bringer of good tidings for business and the Federal treasury in the opening of testimony before the House Ways and Means Committee today on the Collier bill.

Advocating a brew of four percent alcohol by volume, Levi Cooke, of Washington, and R. A. Huber, of St. Louis, on behalf of the United States Brewers Association, estimated a \$5 a barrel tax would enrich the Treasury by \$330,000,000 a year.

PRESIDENT DEFIES DEMAND FOR BONUS

Ask Sharp Curtailment In Payments To Veterans; Manufacturers Sales Tax Urged Is Virtually Same as That Sought Last Year; Pay Cuts Asked

Washington, Dec. 7. (AP)—President Hoover presented to Congress today a drastically reduced budget, recommending a 2 1/4 percent manufacturers excise tax, retention of the gasoline tax, rigid economies, including an additional 11 percent cut in government salaries, and a big slash in veterans' benefits.

He asked for total appropriations of \$4,218,808,344, saying net expenditures would total \$3,256,354,900 against receipts of \$2,949,162,713—Leaving a deficit of \$307,192,187. It was to offset this that the new taxation was proposed.

Neither did Mr. Hoover make any mention of legalization of beer. Estimated internal revenue collections included no figure from this source.

The President estimated the present fiscal year would end next June with a deficit of \$1,146,478,897, expenditures being \$3,770,735,000 and es-

Dwindling Incomes Cut U.S. Revenues

How Earnings of Nation's Taxpayers Faded In 1930 and 1931 Experienced to Congress in Mills Report; Mainstay of Support Is Greatly Curtaild

Washington, Dec. 7.—(AP)—Now the income of the nation's taxpayers faded away in 1930 and 1931 swiftly wiping out the government's chief source of revenue and making new taxes mandatory was explained to Congress today in the annual report of Secretary Mills.

The secretary gave statistics showing that the class of taxpayers who produced 97 per cent of the income had sharply diminished. The class is that with incomes of ten thousand dollars or above. In 1928 there were 15,789 taxpayers who had incomes of a hundred thousand dollars or more, while in 1930 there were 6,152 and in 1931 this had dropped to 3,142.

The number of taxpayers in 1931 having incomes of \$5,000 or more decreased 27.1 per cent from 1900. The taxes dropped 3.1 per cent with 556-120 persons paying \$233,943,000. The greatest drop was in the \$100,000 or more class, which yielded \$107,896,000 as compared with \$237,716,000 the year previous.

The secretary said the net income of persons reporting \$5,000 or more had dropped, from \$16,299,000,000 in 1928 to \$10,899,000,000 in 1930 and to \$6,459,000,000 in 1931. Income from the sales or real estate stock etc., dropped

Introducing the bill, Borah told the Senate the act had proved "wholly unsatisfactory." He proposed to repeal the entire law except the rider attached at his instigation for expansion of the currency.
