\$2,000 MORE SENT FOR RELIEF FUNDS

Makes Total of Around \$7,000 of Government Money Received Here

An additional allocation of funds, this time \$2,000, has been made to Vance county for relief work in this city and county during the first two weeks of December.

The fund is administered by Mrs. W. B. Waddill, welfare superintendent of the county, and most of it is spent in furnishing food and other necessities to families where there is unemployment and no means of subsistence other than from this source.

The money is sent here by the State relief organization after it has been made available to that body by the Federal government.

The largest single amount in the latest distribution was \$20,000 to Mecklenburg county, and a number of counties received \$500.

Coroner Changes Decision Reached Monday; Funeral Services Held

After deciding Monday that the death of James E. Burroughs came about by suicide, Coroner E. G. Garner today changed his ruling.

It was said that when the body was recovered from the well it was as he fell into the well.

Funeral services were held this afternoon at 3 o'clock at Herndon Methodist church, with interment in the church cemetery, and with the pastor, Rev. Mr. Critcher, in charge.

Burroughs was a leading member of the Dabney school board and of the Dabney Masonic lodge members of which were in charge of the service at the cemetery.
