Industry Control Be be Felt Here

June 27, at which all manufacturers who object to the regulations may present their objections, Major Fletcher said.

The prevailing work week in most North Carolina textile mills for male labor has been from 66 to 70 hours a week, Major Fletcher said, although the prevailing work week for women is 55 hours. Under this new act, all these hours must be reduced to 40 a week, the week to consist of five days each, 8 hours a day, with a minimum wage of not less than \$10 a week for the lowest paid labor. It is expected that a wage scale providing more pay for the more skilled classifications will be worked out under the law and made mandatory upon mill operators.

Another provision in this law likely to prove a thorn in the side of a good many mill operators, is that contain in Section 7 of the act, which stipulates that all employees in all industries in all states, shall have the right to organize and bargain collectively—that is, form or join labor unions—without interference from the mill management. It also provides that none of the employers may force any employee to join company unions. This section, then, prohibits employers from interfering in any way with the right of employees to organize or join unions and to bargain collectively.

This entire act, especially the section with regard to hours, wages and the right of employees to organize and join unions, is expected to meet with much disapproval from such operators as the Coles and Entwistles in Rockingham, and other operators who have always maintained they had the right to fix the hours of labor and rate of pay to suit themselves. But there is nothing they can do about it now, under this new act. Nor can they prevent the employees from organizing independent unions or joining ones already organized. The law is on the side of the employees and there is nothing the operators can do about it.

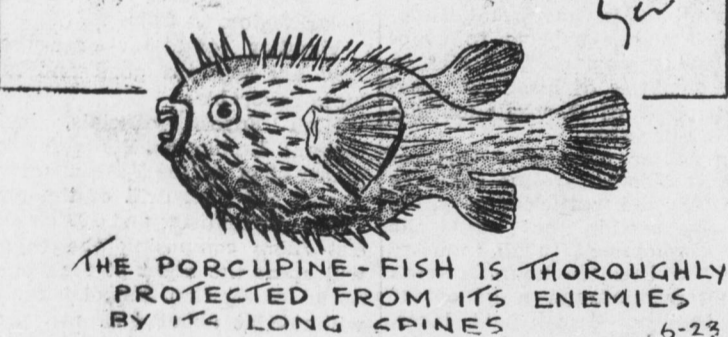

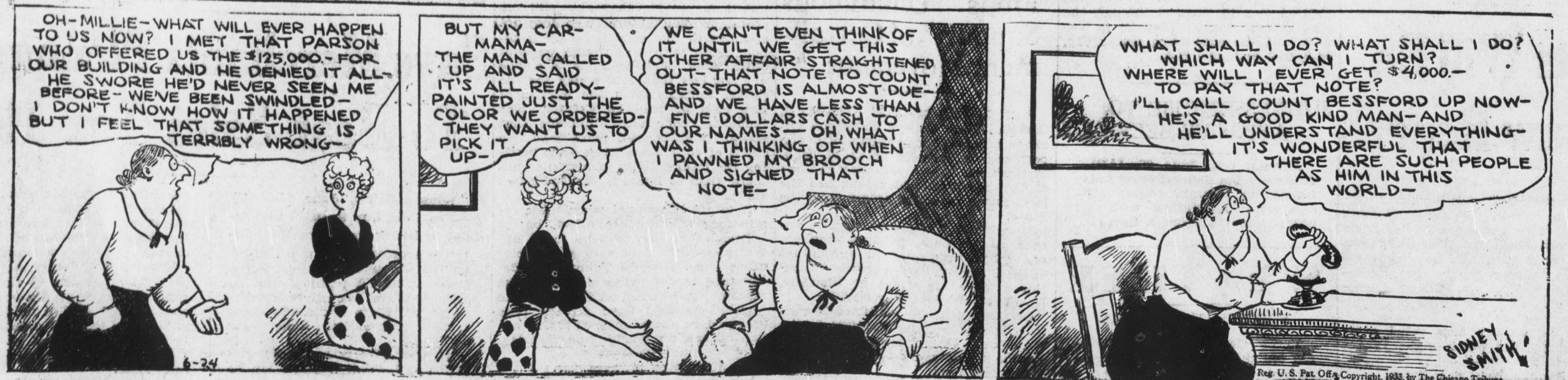
