**UPPER CLASSMEN AT U. N. C. REGISTERING**

**Graduate School Roll Points To Largest Number In Its History**

Chapel Hill, Sept. 21 - Upperclassmen and graduate and professional students were registering today at the University of North Carolina, with indications that the graduate school enrollment would be the largest in its history.

Due principally to the fine ground work laid by the Dean of Students' office during the orientation program the registration of freshmen proceeded smoothly yesterday.

Registration for credit for all students will be allowed through September 28.

While the upperclassmen were getting lined up today, the freshman were continuing their orientation program with a tour of the University Library and a series of student government lectures.

A big pep meeting at which several members of the football team spoke briefly was held in Gerrard Hall last night. Presiding was Head Cheerleader Ernest W. Hunt of Greenboro.

The formal opening of the University has been set for tomorrow morning at 10:30 o'clock when for the first time all freshmen and upperclassmen will attend a gathering together. The program will last half an hour. Classes will begin at 8:30 Friday morning.

damaged and about \$50,000 will be needed to rebuild and repair this

bridge." Chairman Jeffrey said. "Most of the other damage is that done to the ocean highway in Dare county, between Kitty Hawk and Nag's Head, and to the causeway approach to the Dare county bridge just before getting to Manteo. Indications are that at least \$100,000 will be required to repair this stretch of highway as a result of the damage done by the two storms."

Maintenance forces and prisoners are still working as rapidly as possible digging ditches from the highway to the ocean to drain the water off about 10 miles of the highway. Chairman Jeffrey said it is hoped that this water can be drained off by today or tomorrow, following which the engineers will be able to determine more accurately just how badly this section of highway is damaged. The damage from the first storm was estimated at \$50,000 and it is believed it has been damaged a new inlet from the ocean into the county bridge leading across to Manteo, cutting through about 300 feet of the causeway leading to the bridge. This will have to be filled in again and the pavement restored.

"The wonder of it all is, however, that the storm did not do more damage than it did to houses and buildings in its path as well as to bridges and highways," Jeffrey said.

purchased at 11 cents a yard. The new price includes the new processing tax imposed by the Federal government.

5,000 yards of horizontal grey and white striped material for C Grade, or the lowest grade, prisoners, also at 23 cents a yard. This also cost only 11 cents a yard a year ago.

20,000 yards of grey material for Grade A prisoners, who are not compelled to wear stripes, also at 23 cents a yard.

10,000 yards of blue and white striped "hickory" shirting, at 14 1/2 cents a yard. A year ago this shirting cost only 7 1/2 cents a yard.

20,000 yards of sheeting for night shirts and sheets, at 8 cents a yard. A year ago this same grade of sheeting cost only 4 cents a yard.

All this cloth will be made into clothing for the prisoners in the clothing factory in the Central Prison here, where the women prisoners are employed.

This order was placed under the terms of the contract submitted to the Division of Purchase and Contract in the letting of September 14 and approved by the Advisory Budget Commission.
