Large Increase In State Revenue During November

(Continued from Page One.) crease in sales tax collection, which showed an increase of \$137,848 over collections in September, when they amounted to \$411,755. But the increase in September was partly due to the fact that the quarterly returns from merchants who had collections of less counties are as follows: than \$10 a month were due then.

"November sales tax collections however, amountin gto \$595,391, exceed October collections by \$45,688 and do not represent any quarterly collec tions, with the result that we fee much encouraged," Commissione Given For Merit Maxwell said. "This would also indi cate that retail business is picking up considerably over the State. The No vember returns are from 12,602, while the October returns were from 17,720 merchants, because of the number o quarterly returns." While there are more than 26,000

registered retail merchants on the books of the Sales Tax Division, this does not mean that there are almos 12,000 merchants who were de inquen ed all office managers to disregard all in November, it was pointed out by requests of this sort and to assign men Director Harry McMullan of the Sales there were about 12,000 merchants whose tax collections amounted to less than \$10 in November and that they hence did not need to make any returns. The entire 26,000 merchants will not have to make a return until January 1, when all of them will have to report their collections, regardless of whether they are more or less than \$10 it was explained. The collections from the beer tax in

November amounted to only \$23,503, the lowest it has fallen yet since the sale of beer in the State was legalized. In October the beer tax collections were \$30,431; in September, \$31,376; in August, \$39,930 and in July \$39,068. This would indicate that the consumption of beer has been steadily decreasing since July and August. The arrival of cold weather, of course, is one reason for the decided decrease in the revenue from beer in November, since beer is admittedly a warm weather drink.

License tax collections showed a substantial increase in November over those in November of last year, being \$120,699 this past month as compared with \$63,977 in November a year ago. Franchise tax collection this past month amounted to only \$128,445 however, as compared with \$357,170 in November a year ago. This variation is partly due, of course, to changes made in the corporation franchise taxes by the 1933 general assembly Income tax collections amounted to \$132.619 in November as compared with \$128,818 in November of last year.

A study of the revenue collected from the various sources clearly indicates, however, that there has been no material increase in revenue from the regular revenue sources over last year except from the tax on gasoline. This indicates that if the general as sembly had not enacted the sales tax that the general fund revenue would lack about \$600,000 a month of being enough to meet the operating expenses of the state. All of the revenue from the sales tax and several millions of dollars more from other sour ces is going to make up the \$16,000,000 a year appropriated for the operation
