

## Committee Is Named For White Way Celebration

Acting Under Sponsorship of Kiwanis Club, With M. C. Miles Probably As Chairman

WILL HOLD MEETING WITHIN FEW DAYS

Plan To Invite Governor and Highway Chief Here For Celebration of Completion of Street Project; Tentative Date Is Expected To Be Set Soon

M. C. Miles, named by the Kiwanis club as chairman of the committee to arrange for a celebration of the completion of the Garnett street paving and white way project, today announced the central committee to have charge of the preparations for the event, intended to be one of the biggest civic affairs Henderson has had in many years.

In addition to himself, the committee consists of R. G. S. Davis, S. C. Stevenson, J. Harry Bryan, D. C. Loughlin and Henry A. Dennis, with Mayor Irvine B. Watkins an ex-officio member.

This group is to be called together for its first meeting in the next few days, Mr. Miles said, and the first broad plans for the celebration will be laid down at that time. Several sub-committees of men not on the central committee will be named to look after other details of the arrangements and as soon as this preliminary work has been started the plans are to begin taking on definite shape.

Governor Ehringhaus and E. B. Jeffress, chairman of the State Highway Commission, and other notables will be invited to attend the celebration and these two high officials will probably be asked to speak briefly.

There has been considerable discussion of various proposals for the celebration, but none is with authority pending sanction by the committee. The paving is expected to be completed within a few days, and work will start soon thereafter in installing the standards for the white way lighting system. A tentative date for the celebration will probably be named by the central committee as one of its first acts.

## JACKSON MAN HURT IN ACCIDENT DIES

C. G. Peoples, 64, Develops Pneumonia After Injury Thursday

C. G. Peoples, 64, lawyer of Jackson, Northampton county, died in Maria Parham hospital here Tuesday evening at 6:40 o'clock of pneumonia, a complication which developed after he sustained severe injuries in an automobile wreck a mile south of Henderson last Thursday morning when en route to Raleigh to attend the Democratic State Convention.

Four other men, including Garland and Euxton Midyette, sons of the late Judge Garland E. Midyette, also of Jackson, who were in the car and were injured, were discharged from the hospital several days ago. Mr. Peoples' injuries were not considered serious, and doctors said he would have recovered from them had not pneumonia developed. He suffered several fractured ribs in the wreck.

Mr. Peoples is survived by his wife and a son, it was learned today. Plans for the funeral were not definitely learned here, but the services were expected to be held at Jackson, probably today or tomorrow. The body was taken to Jackson last night.

Mr. Peoples was prominent in political affairs in Northampton county, and was a well known attorney of his section of the State.

## Guard Units Here To Camp In July

Company C to Camp Glenn Saturday, July 7, And Medical Regiment Units Go To Camp Jackson July 22; Both To Be Gone Period of Two Months

Company C, infantry, and the various local units of the 105th Medical Regiment located here will go to camp next month, and dates for the encampment were announced today.

Company C will, as usual, go to Camp Glenn, Morehead City, and will leave here Saturday, July 7. They will be joined here by the companies from Oxford and Warrenton and will travel on a special train to Raleigh, where other units will also be taken on. The trip to Morehead will be over the Norfolk Southern from Raleigh by way of Wilson, Greenville, Washington and New Bern. The company is expected to carry virtually its entire personnel of three officers Captain T. S. Kittrell, First Lieutenant C. B. Sturges and Second Lieutenant G. M. O'Neil and 54 enlisted men to camp. It is recruited up to full peace-time strength at the present time. The men will be away for 15 days. Approximately 20

units with a little over 1,000 soldiers will be in camp at Camp Glenn for the annual summer encampment.

The service company and the band and the headquarters staff of the 105th Medical Regiment will leave here Sunday, July 22, for Camp Jackson, near Columbia, S. C., for their annual 15-day encampment. Captain James N. O'Neil is commander of the service company, and the band is in command of Lieutenant Ben Urquhart. In the two outfits are two officers and 77 men. In addition, Colonel Hodge A. Newell, of Henderson, is in command of the regiment, and there are eight officers on his staff, all but three of them Henderson men. The medical units from this city will number almost 100 men.

## RATINGS GIVEN IN RIFLE SHOOTINGS

Company C Was 78th In National Contest, With 312 Entries

FIVE IN THIS STATE

Warrenton Company Made Best Record for North Carolina; Results Just Learned in Announcement Here

Captain T. S. Kittrell, of Company C, local infantry unit of the North Carolina National Guard, today announced receipt of ratings in the recent National Guard indoor rifle team contest, nationwide in its scope, and in which five North Carolina companies, including his organization here participated.

Teams representing 312 military units, scattered over the nation, participated, the shooting in all instances being in the armories of the companies.

Company C ranked 78th in the national contest, with a score of 2,543 of a possible 6,000; while the Warrenton company ranked 64th with a

score of 2,654, and the Concord company 125th, with a score of 2,560. Headquarters company of the 2nd Battalion, of Albemarle, ranked 176th and the Charlotte company 227th.

The State as a whole ranked 19th out of 34 states participating. Company C of Henderson had three men on the regimental team.

The contests were held last winter this being the first time the competition was supervised by the National Rifle Association.
