

Don Pleasants Shuts Out Oxford Here 9-0

Keeps Visitors' Hits Scattered During Game

Lawrenceville Here Wednesday, Clarksville Thursday, Hillsboro Sunday

Don Pleasants was very effective against Oxford here yesterday afternoon at Louie Park, keeping their nine hits well scattered and shut them out 9 to 0 to give the Henderson Independents a victory.

Hedgcock started on the mound for the visitors, giving up three hits in his four innings stay but he also gave five free passes to first base. He was relieved by Dillihay, who fared no better, giving up seven hits in his four inning sojourn on the mound.

New Headquarters For Forest Fires Control Arranged

In the Six-Water Hotel, Daily Dispatch Bureau BY J. C. BASKERVILLE. Raleigh, Aug. 6.—Combined headquarters for forest fire control activities for the fourth and fifth forestry districts have been established at Washington, N. C. W. McCormick, assistant State forester, announced today.

Supervision of the work will be under the direction of District Forester L. A. Carter, who has moved from Windsor to Washington, a more central location for the two districts. J. R. Miller, chief forest warden headquarters at Ahoakie, and F. L. Hooker, chief forest warden for the fourth district, will remain at New Bern. Under the new set-up, Mr. Carter will direct forest fire protection for 11 counties now cooperating in the State's protective system. These counties are as follows: Bertie, Edgecombe, Halifax, Hertford, Nash, Northampton, Warren, Johnston, Watauga, Wayne, Greene, Lenoir, Pitt, Craven and Beaufort. New headquarters for the arranged sixth forestry district have been established at Wanauch in Columbus county, with E. P. Simmons, formerly chief warden for district two at Lenoir transferred to the new territory.

HIGHWAY PATROL'S WORK COMMENDED

56 State Officers Have Guarded 60,000 Miles of Roads in State

Daily Dispatch Bureau In the Six-Water Hotel, BY J. C. BASKERVILLE. Raleigh, Aug. 6.—The record made by the State Highway Patrol during the past fiscal year, as set out in the report just submitted by Captain Charles D. Farmer, commander of the patrol, was commended today by Commissioner of Revenue A. J. Maxwell, under whose general supervision the patrol operates. He also replied to some of the criticism of the report. "We are not bragging about either the amount of revenue the patrol collect, the number of miles traveled and the number of arrests made, but in view of the amount of work which the patrol has to do and the limited number of men, I think the patrol made an excellent showing last year," Commissioner Maxwell said. "If the patrol had no other duties than to patrol the highways and enforce the motor vehicle laws, it probably could have stopped more cars and made more arrests. But it must be remembered that the 1933 legislature—not the Department of Revenue—decreed that patrolmen should collect revenue and act as gasoline and oil inspectors as well as patrol the highways. It must also be remembered that there are only 56 of these patrolmen to patrol 70,000 miles of highways, check more than 400,000 automobiles and trucks, collect revenue and take samples of gasoline and oil from some 15,000 filling stations and bulk plants over the State. "So in view of these facts, I think the patrol did excellent work last year in patrolling 1,499,474 miles of highway, investigating 1,287 accidents, inspecting 7,448 vehicles for mechanical defects and stopping 73,591 cars for defective lights, all of which were corrected. In addition to this, patrolmen stopped 63,736 other cars for various violations of the motor vehicle laws and extended courtesies to 17,598 other motorists by helping them change tires, get gasoline or performing other services. "But if the patrol is to perform its three-fold duties effectively, it must be enlarged to consist of 200 or 300 men as, Captain Farmer recommends, Commissioner Maxwell maintains.
