Three Suburban Towns Near Barcelona Are Reported In Hands of Anarchists

FEDERAL SOLDIERS SENT TO THE SCENE

Warships Bombarding One Town Held by Extremists; New Flare-Up Comes Just as Government Has Claimed It Had Broken Backbone of Revolt

Madrid, Spain, Oct. 8 (AP)-Ovideo, seat of a huge government arsenal, was taken by rebels today in a new outburst of revolt against the government, cropping out simultaneously at several points.

Reports from Barcelona said three towns in the outskirts of the city. Matorell, Sabadell and Badalona, were in the hands of anarchists. Troops were dispatched to the trouble cen-

Reports reaching Madrid also said troops were bombarding Ugo and Gijon in Asturias province, where the rebels were reported solidly entrenched. Warships were bombarding Zijon laying down a barrage for advancing troops. The reports said the rebels were equipped with machine guns and light artillery and were well for tified within the city. Casualties were reported to be heavy.

In the capital, government forces pounced upon the anarchists and syndicalist revolutionary committee, arresting its members.

Barcelona reported troops and revels were staging pitched battles with n the city, with the telephone exchange in danger of falling into extremist hands at any moment.

Raleigh, Oct. 8 .- Rates to small power users who buy their powe: from the Carolina Power and Light Company will get a reduction in rates effective December 1, Chairman Stanley Winborne, of the State Utilities Commission, said here today. The ex-KILLED BY THE REBELS act schedule of rate reductions has not yet been filed with the commission as yet, so he was unable to give the amount of the reduction. The lower rates will result in a material saving to the smaller power users, however, he indicated. The reduction will be the same that will go into effect in South Carolina on December 1. Aged Head of Supreme Court Resigns Because of Failing Health

Columbia, S. C., Oct. 8. (AP)—Chief Justice E. S. Blease, of the South Carolina Supreme Court, formally re-signed his place on the bench as the court convened here today for its regular October term.

After calling the court at 10 a. m., the chief justice immediately turned over to J. H. Westbrook, clerk of the court, a second acceptance of his resignation received from Governor Blackwood to be entered upon the court records.

"Under the constitution, the general assembly having failed to elect a man to take my place," Chief Justice Blease said, "Mr. Senior Associate Justice Stabler becomes presiding officer of the court, and turned over the gavel to the St. Matthews jurist. Judge M. M. Mann, of the fifth circuit, then presented the chief justice a large silver tray, a gift of all the members of the State judiciary. Chief Justice Blease tendered his resignation to overnor Blackwood last March 28 to take effect today, giving failing health as the reason for his retirement.
