TWO TALKS HEARD BY ROTARY CLUB

G. B. Blum and R. G. Harrison Speak to Civic Club on Farm Relations

Two very interesting talks were heard by the Rotary club at its regular weekly meeting Tuesday evening at 6:30 o'clock in the American Legion Hall.

George B. Blum, vocation agriculture teacher for Vance county, spoke to the group on "the obligation of the city man to the rural man." R. G. Harrison executive vice president of the First National Bank, followed with "The rural man's obligation to the city man."

Both talks were most interesting and clearly showed that the line of demarcation between the two is gradually fading as a result of rural electrification, R. F. D., good roads and other modern features. The speakers told of the friendly attitude that now exists between the two, how the frequent visits of the rural man to the city has brought him in closer contact with the city man, bringing on better relations. Both speakers agreed that the rural and city man were each dependant upon the other.

The next meeting of the club, scheduled for Nov. 6, has been postponed in order that the group may meet in joint session with the American Legion and the remaining civic club in the city on Nov. 12 in celebration of Armistice Day.

On November 15, the club will go to Oxford for an inter-city meeting, this taking the place of their meeting for Nov. 13 it was stated by the secretary.

LIBRARY RECEIVES A NEW DICTIONARY

This Edition of Webster's Volume Said To Have Cost One and One-Third Million Dollars

A copy of the new edition of Webster's New International Dictionary has just been received at the Perry Library, and is now ready for reference by library patrons. Miss Louise McDearman, the librarian, announced today. This new edition is said to have been produced at a cost of one and one third million dollars.

In all, to date, there have been ten Webster and Merriam-Webster Dictionaries: An American Dictionary of the English Language, edited by Noah Webster, in 1828; the Revised Edition, in 1840; a new and revised edition, edited by Chauncey A. Goodrich, in 1847; a revised and enlarged edition with pictorial illustrations and a table of synonyms, edited by Chauncey A. Goodrich, in 1859; the Unabridged, with vocabulary three times the size of the 1828 dictionary, and with etymologies revised, with Noah Porter as editor in chief, in 1864; the Unabridged, with a pronouncing biographical dictionary in 1879, and with a pronouncing gazetteer in 1884; the International with Noah Porter as editor in chief and omnis J. Campbell as general editor, in 1890; the International, with supplement, in 1900; and the New International, having more than 400,000 entries, with W. T. Harris as editor in chief and F. Sturges Allen as general editor in 1909.

After it was stated here Oct. 11 that automatic revolvers do not exist, he presented proof that there is a "Wesley-Fosbery" automatic revolver, the only one made. This type of arm is rather scarce in this country, but is rather widely used in Europe.

"The distinguishing characteristic of a pistol is that the chamber holding the cartridge is integral with the barrel. A revolver, on the other hand, has a separate barrel, and the cylinder has a number of chambers, the mechanism of the arm bringing them one at a time in line with the barrel."
