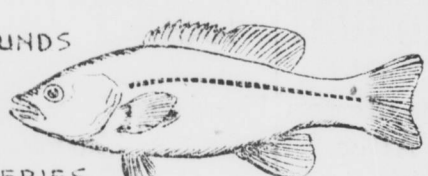


SCOTT'S SCRAPBOOK

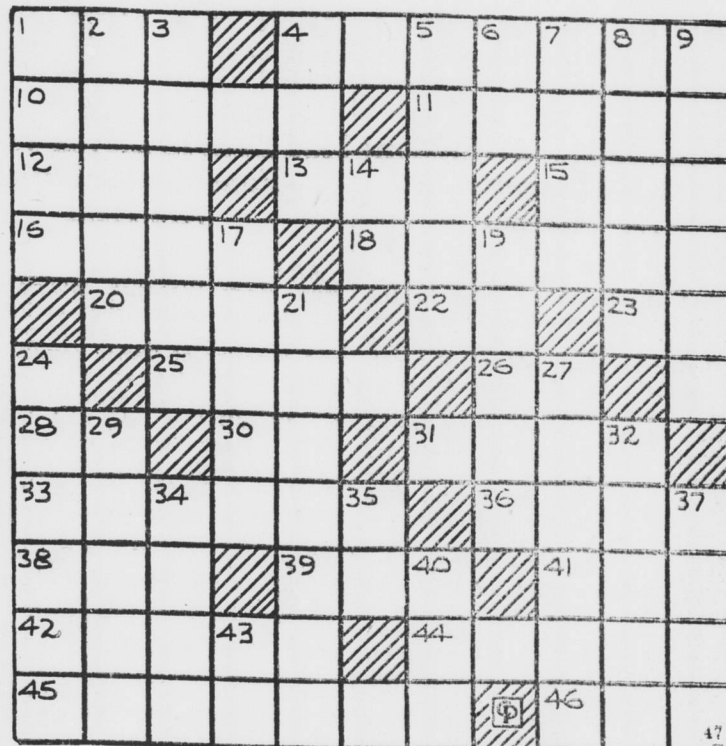

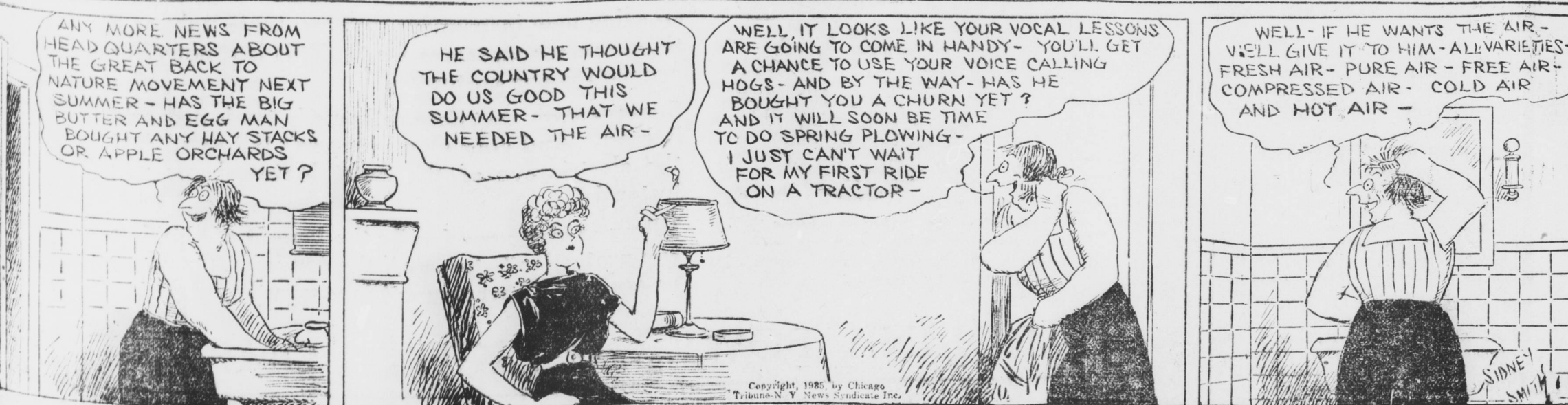
