CONFERENCE REVENUE BILL PASSES SENATE

Senate Group Rejects The Administration NRA Program

2-YEAR EXTENSION PLAN DISREGARDED; TIME FIXED APRIL 1

Three Changes Are Made In Present Set-Up As Approved by the Finance Committee

TO LIMIT CODE TO INTERSTATE TRADE

Prohibition Against Price-Fixing Also Included; President Given Brief Period in Which To Review Present Codes To Make Them Conform

Washington, May 1.—(AP)—The Senate Finance Committee today disregarded the administration's recommendation for a two-year extension of NRA and voted to continue the present law with three changes until April 1 of next year.

As another step in the long controversy over the blue eagle administration, the committee voted 15 to 3 to report out a resolution extending the present law with a prohibition against price fixing and a limitation of codes to interstate business.

A third provision would give President Roosevelt a brief period to review present codes in order to make them conform with the two changes in the law.

The action was taken without formal record vote in a two-hour executive session, marked by virtual unanimity of opinion.

Chairman Harrison, announcing the action, refused to say whether it was satisfactory to President Roosevelt. The chief executive recommended to Congress a two-year extension of NRA but, in a conference with congressional leaders yesterday, was reported to have agreed to sign a resolution merely extending the recovery law until next spring, if Congress preferred that method.

McSwain Is Rebuked By Roosevelt

Washington, May 1.—(AP)—Chairman McSwain, Democrat, South Carolina, today assumed "full blame" for publication of secret testimony of international informant given the House Military Committee by two high army officials.

The gray-haired former soldier returned to his office late this morning from New York, opened a letter of rebuke from President Roosevelt for allowing the testimony to become public, and read it aloud to reporters.

Then he added: "I assume the full blame. The responsibility is mine."

F. D. R. Gives "Go" Signal On Spending

Rural Re-Settlement Division Is the First Of Many To Get On Its Way

Washington, May 1.—(AP)—The "go" signal in his \$4,000,000,000 employment drive was given by President Roosevelt today with the establishment by executive order of the rural re-settlement division intended to move families to places where they can earn a living.

This was the first executive order issued under the job-making program and many others must follow before the entire machine can get in motion.

While not explaining the delay in officially creating the new government unit, the President did announce at his press conference that he has asked Morris Llewellyn Cooke, of Philadelphia, to establish the rural re-settlement division.

Means Superintendent Erwin Would Likely Become School Dictator For State; Would Virtually Hire and Fire Secretary of State School Commission

HOEY AND GRAHAM WILL FIGHT IT OUT FOR GOVERNORSHIP

Neither Has Announced but It Is Certain That Both Will Make Race Next Year

Raleigh, May 1.—The contest for the Democratic nomination for governor in 1936 is now going to be chiefly between Lieutenant Governor A. H. (Sandy) Graham and Clyde B. Hoey, according to most of the opinion expressed here since Congressman Robert L. Doughton announced late Monday that he would not be a candidate. While neither Graham nor Hoey have yet formally announced their candidacies, there is no doubt in the mind of any here but that both of them will run. Already an announced candidate is John A. McRae, of Charlotte. It is also expected that Colonel T. LeRoy Kirkpatrick, also of Charlotte, will likewise become a candidate. But the opinion here is that the campaign between Graham and Hoey will almost completely overshadow the other candidates.

While it is conceded in political circles that the contest will be a close one, it is generally expected that Graham will have the edge.

May Day Brings Rioting And Death As Holiday Is Observed World Over

Greatest Soviet Military Demonstration In History Is Marked by Loud Talk of War; Hitler Says Germany Desires Only Peace; New York Is Vigilant

(By the Associated Press.) The greatest military demonstration in the history of Soviet Russia, at Moscow, today features throughout Germany, a bombing in Vienna, rioting in France and widespread police precautions against possible disturbance in the United States signified May Day celebrations throughout the world today.

In Moscow spokesmen delivered sombre warnings of impending war, while nearly 700 military planes dropped over Red Square, and the massive red army paraded in review.

Klementy Vorshiloff, Soviet commissar for defense told Russian workers that war "hangs like a heavy cloud over humanity," and he assured his comrades and told the world that "if war is imposed upon us, the enemy will get acquainted with our red army."

From all parts of Germany, conspicuously from the newly-acquired Saarland, Germans went to Berlin to celebrate the "day of national labor."

Chancellor Adolf Hitler told more than 1,000,000 workers assembled at Tempelhofer air field that Germany desires only peace with other nations.

U. S. MEDIATOR TO AUTO STRIKE ZONE

McGrady Goes to Detroit To Seek Settlement of Difficulties

Detroit, Mich., May 1.—(AP)—The Federal government sent its auto mediator, Edward F. McGrady, into the trouble zone of the giant automobile industry today to cope with strikes and threats of strikes which have already affected more than 1,300 employees of General Motors Corporation subsidiaries.

Arriving in Detroit late last night by plane, on orders from Secretary Perkins, McGrady set up temporary headquarters, denied himself to interviewers and protested that his mission was secret.

FOOD EXEMPTIONS FROM SALES LEVY TAKEN FROM BILL

Amendment Seeking To Restore Provision Is Badly Beaten by Vote of Senators

LIQUOR BILL FACES ITS TEST TOMORROW

Will Be Sought as Revenue Producer; 23 Senators Have Signed Pledge to Oppose It; Salary Measures For State Officials Are Debated

Raleigh, May 1.—(AP)—The Senate this afternoon passed the revenue bill conference report on second reading. The vote was 28 to 15, not counting pairs.

Sensors Coburn, of Martin; Swarrigan, of Cabarrus, and Burrus, of Guilford, spoke against adoption of the compromise on the tax measure, which strikes out all exemptions of food from the sales tax.

Coburn sought to recess the Senate but was voted down.

As Senator Allsbrook, of Halifax, explained his vote, he censured senators without calling names for their stand on the revenue bill. He was asked by Bagley, of Currituck, if he was explaining his vote or lecturing the Senate, and Allsbrook replied that he was doing both.

Senator Hill, of Durham, champion of the exemptions, said a bill would be introduced next week to supplement the revenue bill and provide for food exemptions. It was understood the exemptions would be made if the revenue from another source, such as liquor, might be found.

A liquor bill is pending in the Senate for consideration tomorrow, but

Negro Jury Problem In Greensboro

Greensboro, May 1.—(AP)—The case of Dr. C. C. Stewart, Negro physician, and Ollie Parrish, a white man, charged with second degree murder for the death of a white woman from the effects of an alleged illegal operation, reached an abrupt impasse in Guilford Superior Court today, and was continued for the term when counsel for Stewart moved to quash the indictment on the grounds that Negroes were excluded from the grand and petit jury list.

Two motions were lodged embracing both the grand and petit jury bodies, based on the recent decision of the United States Supreme Court in the celebrated Scottsboro case, gaining a new trial to the defendant Norris on the ground that Negroes were excluded from the Alabama jury list.

Agreeing that the State should be given time in which to study the matters at issue, the court ordered the cases continued.

\$35 Bounty For Cotton Is Proposed

Per Bale Subsidy On Exports Offered Washington For Processing Tax

Grenville, S. C., May 1.—(AP)—Seeking alleviation of the cotton processing tax, southern textile interests will propose to the government tomorrow that it establish a bounty of \$35 per bale to be paid manufacturers on exported cotton goods, it was announced here today.

Samuel C. Lamport, New York exporter and author of the plan, said here today that the proposal had not met with a warm reception at the recent August meeting of the American Manufacturers Association, and that it would probably form the focal point in discussions in Washington to-
