

Henderson Takes Fast Game From Hillsboro Saturday

Rain In Fourth Halts Sunday Game With Bulls

Durham Whips Oxford, 4-3, Ca-Vel-Jalong Unreported; Edwards Hurls

With Edwards allowing only three hits, Henderson whipped Hillsboro here Saturday, 3 to 1, in a Central States League contest, gaining their first victory in second half play in the loop.

The game was one of the prettiest played of the season with Henderson getting enough runs in the fourth inning to win the contest.

Breedlove was the leading hitter for the locals, getting a triple, double and single out of four tries. Hillsboro hits were scattered among as many players.

Edwards set eight men down by the strikeout route.

The Bulls whipped Oxford 4-3 in the only other game reported in League play. Ca-Vel and Jalong tangled, the result was not made known.

Rain Halts Contest

Rain in the fourth inning yesterday afternoon broke up the scheduled contest between Henderson and the Durham Bulls with the Bulls leading 3 to 0. Lefty Parker was on the mound for the visitors, having allowed only one hit of the scratch variety before the deluge. He appeared to have the Tourists eating out of his hand as he soupedpawed them into submission.

May Lose Team Here

Skipper Pahlman stated last night that support had not been the best in the world, and that he was continuing to lose money with his baseball venture. If support at the gate does not pick up, he will have to disband his ball club, leaving Henderson without a representative in the Central States League.

The team has played better than average baseball all through the season, and has a good chance of going some place in the second half if they can hold together until the end of the season. Pahlman started the season with a handicap of debt saddled on him for repairs to the park. He has worked hard to push off the burden but running expenses has about kept up with the gate receipts, giving him very little working capital or enough money to retire his outstanding debt.
