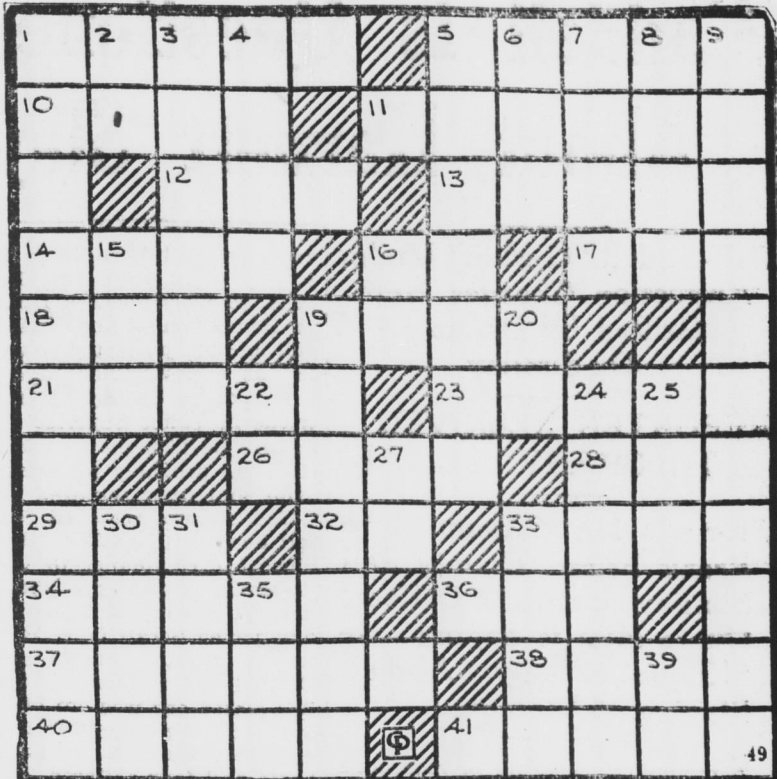

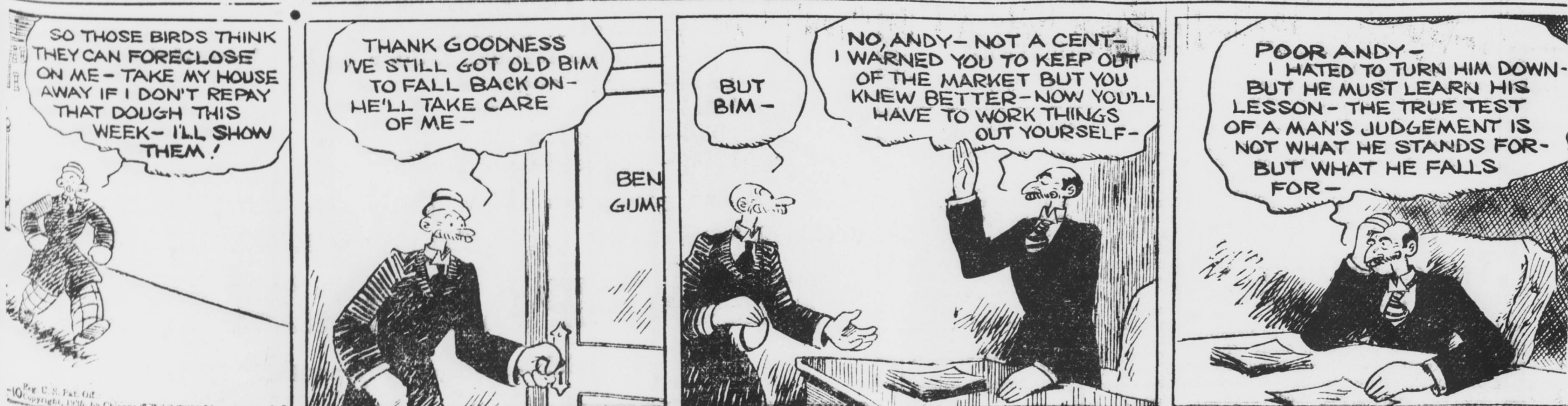

Contract Bridge

TOO GREAT STRENGTH
EVERY PLAYER knows the first part of the following rule: "Lead through strength. . . ." Few appear to know the last part of the same rule: "But not through too great strength." I just saw a game made, instead of going down two tricks, because the opening lead violated the general rule against blindly leading the suit bid by dummy.

Probably East thought that South's diamonds were very weak, as he did not rebid the suit. In any event the opening lead was the 3 of diamonds. West's K won the trick, and East was in with the Q. Back went the 4 of clubs. Declarer went up with dummy's Ace, winning his first trick.

Three rounds of trumps pulled all opposing spades. The 10 of diamonds was overtaken with dummy's J, and four rounds of that suit were taken. Upon the last three rounds declarer discarded both his clubs and one heart. He ruffed a club lead from dummy, and led his last trump, but East hung onto his Ace of hearts which finally won the third defensive trick, giving North his 4-odd.

South plays 4-Spades. West doubles. West takes two diamond tricks, then ruffs declarer with a third diamond. East's 4-odd is the only call that can be defeated.

Bidding went: South, 1-Diamond; North, 1-Spade; South, 3-Spades; North, 4-Spades.

Although members of the declaring side held powerful hands there was a bad distribution of opposing honors, both hearts and clubs, which with ordinary defensive strategy should have given opponents several tricks, defeating the game contract.

The normal opening lead is East's 4 of clubs, giving West two tricks in that suit. West's proper return lead, after winning the opening lead with his K or J of clubs is a heart.
