## Caddell Is Questioned About Harnett Slaying

Abduction Charges Here Grilled by Officers On Sunday

REPORTED REMOVED TO GRANVILLE JAIL

Story Is He Attemped to Break From County Jail Sunday Evening; Officers "Knows Plenty About" Slaying of Woman.

A preliminary hearing in recorder's court today for J. H. Caddell, selfstyled government agent, on a charge of abduction of Mrs. Robert Watkins, wife of a Vance county farmer, was postponed, and there were reports. not confirmed by officers, that Caddell had been removed to the Granville county jail in Oxford after a reputed attempt to break from the Vance county jail last night.

Caddell was questioned at great length over the week-end by Sheriff brought here yesterday to look at wife. Caddell with a view to identifying him as a member of the slaying party, and a report said that he identified would not confirm this, however

late Sunday afternoon for an unrevealed destination, said Caddell had admitted that he "knew plenty" about Mrs. Mason's killing, but refused to be specific. The departure of the two officers was understood to be in investigation of clues developed by the questioning of Caddell. Sheriff Hamleft was still absent from town today.

It was learned by officers here that Caddell at one time did some undercover work for federal authorities, al-Caddell as one of the group. Officers though he was not commissioned to do the work nor did he receive any Sheriff Hamlett, before leaving here renumeration for his self-imposed activities, it was stated.

Last year Caddell was in Farmville Va., and hinted that his neck had been broken in an automobile accident. An ambulance was called from Danville and the "injured" man taken to a hospital in the latter city. Physicians probed and prodded, examined him thoroughly but were unable to find any dislocated veretebrae. It de veloped that Caddell was able throw his neck out of joint, or least to give the appearance of broken neck. The hospital officials caught on to the trick and Caddell was tried for perpetrating a fraud on the hospital. He was convicted and sent to the city farm, from which he escaped and was never caught.

## Resigns On ABC Board

No Reason Given in Letter to Chairman Watkins: He Is Still Serving, However.

Henry T. Morris has sent his resignation as a member of the Vance County Alcoholic Beverage Control Board to Chairman Samuel M. Watkins of the Vance Board of County Commissioners, it was learned today He has been requested by Mr. Watkins to continue in office until the January meeting of the county commissioners, when his successor will probably be chosen.

Mr. Morris is one of the three members of the ABC board named by the commissioners to manage the ABC store authorized by the voters of the county last June, and which was opened for business on Monday, July 15. The other two members of the board are T. H. Crudup, chairman, and George A. Rose, Sr.

Mr. Morris has had strong hopes all along that the county-owned and opbetter control of the liquor situation. At different times since the liquor store was opened, various arrests have been made of defendants charged with the illegal handling of liquor, and in nearly every instance jury trials were called for in the recorder's or police courts and acquittals resulting. While it is understood that this condition was not pleasing to Mr. Morris, the extent to which that may or may not have been a factor in his resignation from the board was not learned.

When asked today about rumors about town that he had resigned, Mr. Morris only replied that "you can hear anything." Mr. Crudup would not state that Mr. Morris had resigned, but said he met with the ABC board at a session this morning
