McDonald Is Near Majority In Newspaper Poll

MAKES FRACTIONAL GAIN FOR WEEK AS HOEY DROPS SOME CORPORATION

Ralph W. McDonald increased his commanding lead as 2,562 new votes were counted this week in the Statewide poll on the Democratic governorship being conducted by The Henderson Daily Dispatch and 24 cooperating newspapers.

McDonald polled 48 per cent of the new votes, while his nearest competitor, Clyde R. Hoey, slipped further, getting but 33.25 per cent of the new votes. Sandy Graham in third place, accelerated his pace, polling 17 per cent of the new votes, while the low man, John A. McRae, slipped slightly, getting 1.75 per cent of the new votes. 
