

Coffey and Macklin Cases In Opinions Handed Down by Court

Raleigh, Oct. 14 .- (AP)-Reed Cofand Evans Macklin lost appeals from death sentences today in decisions handed down by the State Supreme Court.

The court decided 56 cases. Coffey was convicted in Avery county of the murder of Hardie Coffey and Macklin was found guilty in Halifax of the murder of Chief of Police A. P. Moore, of Scotland Neck. The court found "no error" in the capital cases.


