Meals Tax To Stick. Certainly the Senate, which has grave and serious consideration, .s unlikely to recede from the position it has taken on the roll call votes. Twice it has rejected amendments by Senator A. Hall Johnston, of Buncombe, who sought to exempt meals. The votes were 22 to 20 the first time and 25 to 21 the second, indicating that an absolute majority of the Senate favors the tax.

Westerners are crying lustily that this is "another slap at the West," legislators contending that the tax on meals will be destructive to the tourist traffic; but their lamentations seem destined to fall on deaf ears from all indications.

Those who voted to tax meals took the stand that the party platform also pledged the Democrats to remove the sales tax from "all necessities" and they point to the fact that meals are no more "necessities" than shoes and groceries sold at the corner store, from which the tax has not been re-




