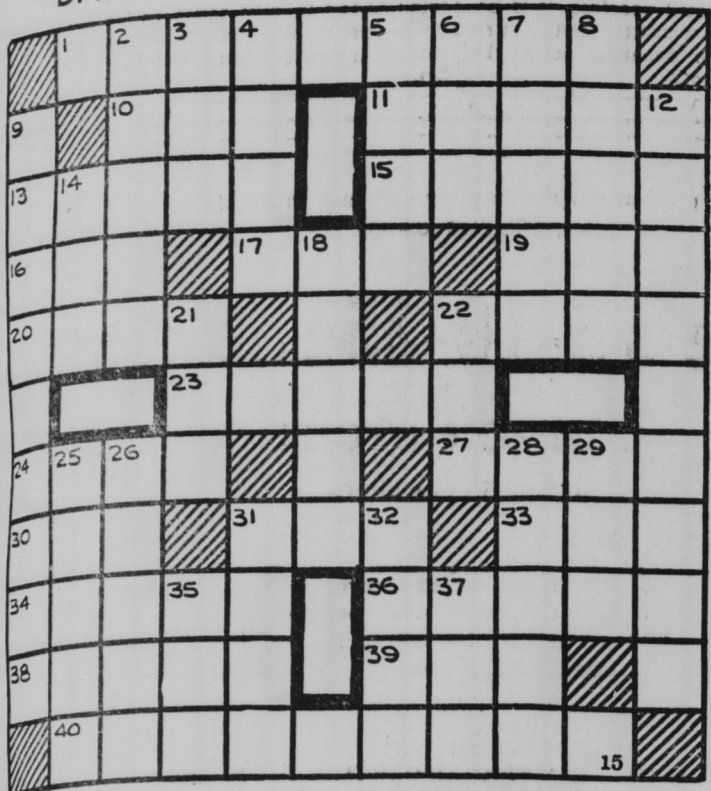

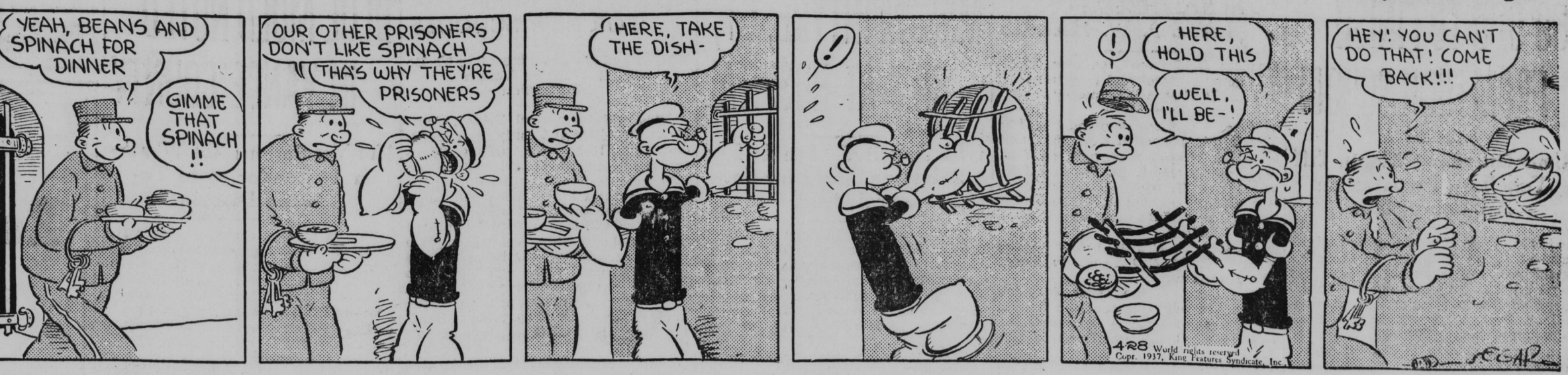

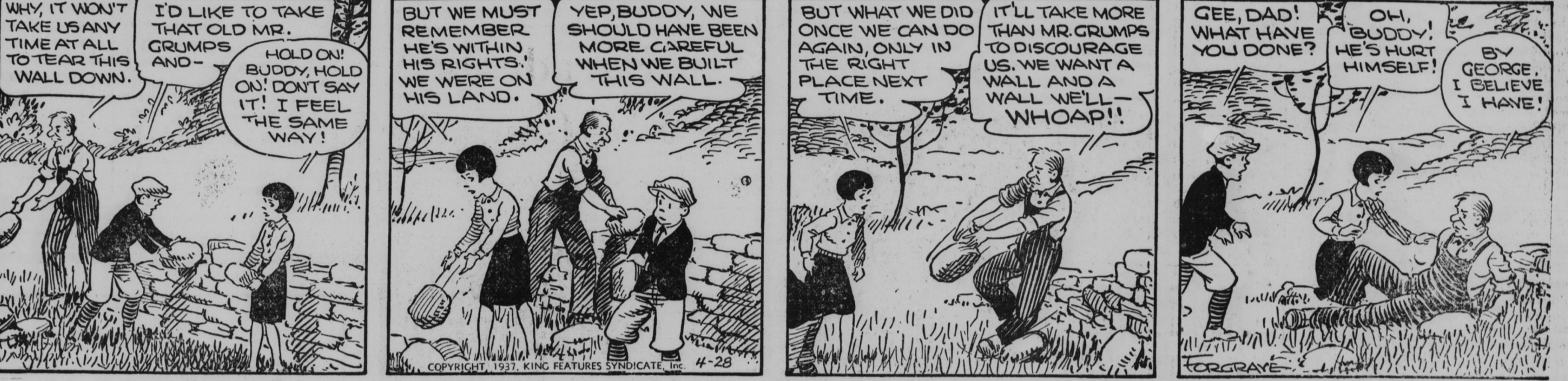

GAME FISH SWIMS UPSTREAM
 AN EASY road for the declarer can be made difficult sometimes if one defender has the nerve to toss off his honors with apparent abandon and thereby make an entry for his partner, who holds the setup remains of his suit.  Three South players in a duplicate played this deal at 3-No Trump and each one handled the situation differently.
 In response to East's 2-Clubs overall, after North's spade bid, the West players led the club 4, which East won with the club Ace and returned the club J. South ducked this, but won the third round of clubs.
 At one table the heart 2 was now led and the Q finessed, then the heart Ace laid down and a third heart, which West won with the heart K. West returned a diamond, which South won with the

K, cashed his thirteenth heart and led another diamond to the Q. After the spade Ace was cashed a diamond was led to the South hand and two diamonds cashed, making the contract.
 At the second table, when the heart 2 was led, West, visualizing what was about to happen, tossed the heart K and declarer won with the heart Ace. When the heart Q was led, West played the heart J, so that the third heart trick was won by East, who cashed his remaining clubs and set the contract two.
 At the third table, the West player also tossed his heart K on the first heart lead, but this declarer, Merwin D. Maier of New York, allowed him to hold the trick, playing the heart 7, so that East never got into the lead until after the contract was made.

Some Sanitary Problems For Trailer Dwellers

THE NEW development of trailer life has brought with it medical problems which must be solved immediately. Trailers are for a great many people, homes, and homes have to be made sanitary both for those who live in them and for those who live around them. The trailer and its family can move away from its refuse and from some of its sanitary problems. The recommendation which is imposed being entirely on those temporary neighbors who are left behind. The trailer family must develop a public conscience to cope with this, or else the trailer family must be that if those obligations are not met, redress is not to be had.

In San Francisco, the city has published a Sanitary Code for Automobile Trailers. The recommendations that all trailers should be equipped with an air-tight container of not less than five gallons capacity for the storage of garbage. This container must be emptied only in places approved and so designated by the health authorities of a particular locality. If the trailer is equipped with running water and a flush toilet, an adequate sewage tank should be provided underneath the trailer for the collection and storage of

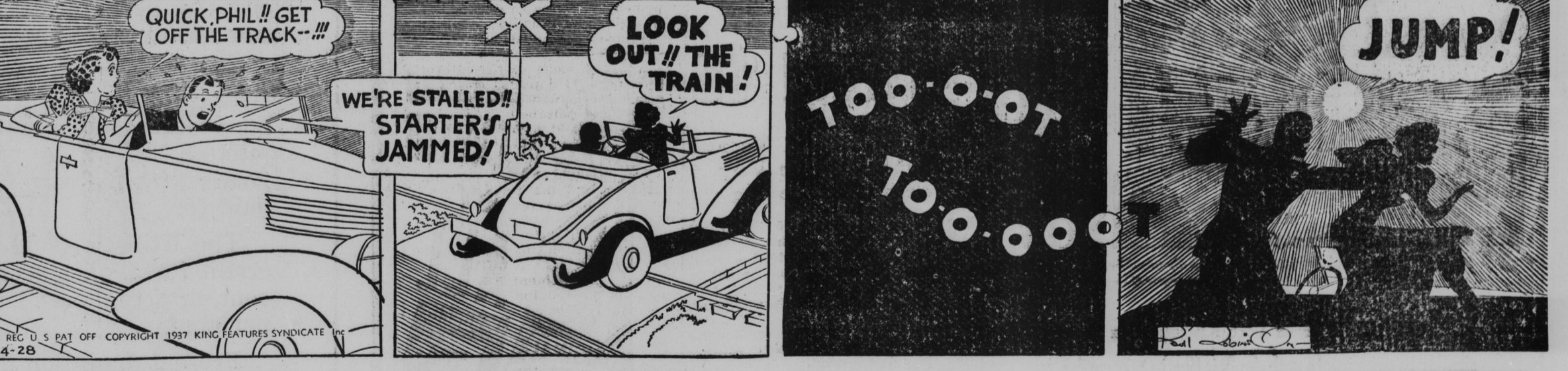
such waste. The tank should be emptied only into sewer connection or by other approved methods of disposal provided by the community. When equipped with water tanks for the use of the trailer family, these tanks must be inspected by an approved health authority at intervals of six months, so as to guarantee the potability of the water. Regulations concerning parking, food supply, ventilation, cleanliness and screening also are included in this code. Pasteurized milk is recommended exclusively, although it seems to me that this could be extended to such canned milks as evaporated, Kilim and Dryco.

An especial regulation which applies to trailer families, as it does to any other family, is the necessity for securing medical attention if illness arises. I believe the trailer family should be required to have a certificate showing that they all have been vaccinated against smallpox, diphtheria and typhoid fever.

The hazard which the trailer family itself meets is the provision of safe water and milk. Safe water is available along the highways in most states, and with reasonable precautions this seldom constitutes a problem, but the trailer family must have some guarantee that the water it obtains is safe. The obtaining of safe milk, while slightly more difficult, offers no great hazard to the careful purchaser.

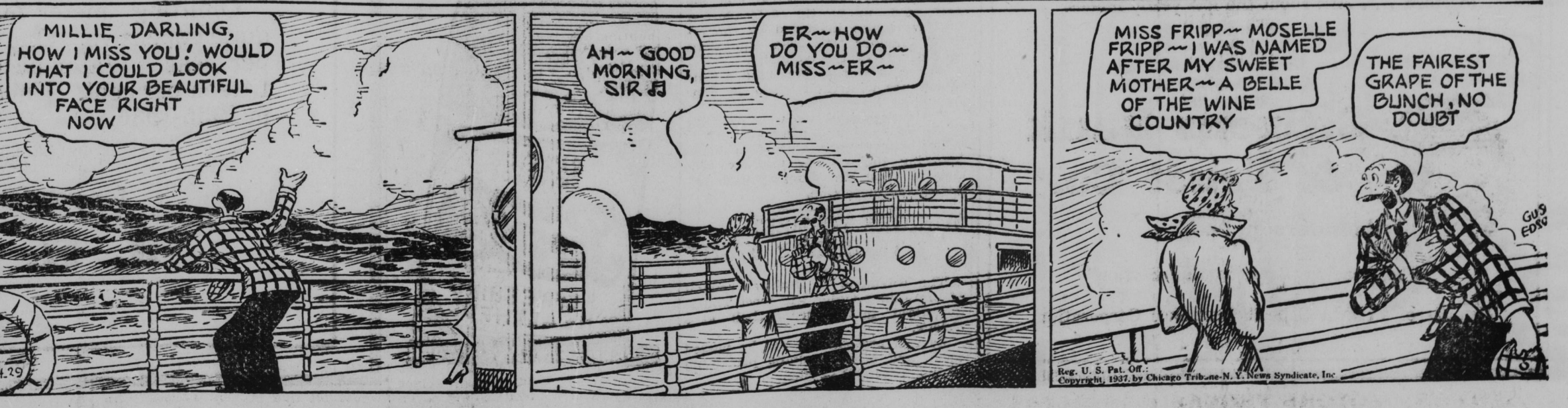
American communities must shortly take cognizance of the trailer element in our lives. Only after provision and facilities have been made for aiding their sanitation, can regulations be enforced,
