Los Angeles, June 7 (AP)-Jean Harlow, the platinum blonde film star actress, died at 11:37 a. m. PST today at the Good Samaritan hospital. Dr. E. C. Fishbaugh, her physician said she never regained consciousness after lapsing into a coma early in

the morning. She was stricken with uremic poisoning that spread to her brain. She was placed in an oxygen tent and two blood transfusions were performed and an intravenous solution administered in an effort to save her. With her at the bedside was her mother, Mrs. Jean Bello.

Miss Harlow, who flashed to fame in 1930 as the screen's "platinum blonde" was taken ill May 29. She had been working on a picture in which she was starred with Clark Gable.
