

Slot Machine Crowd Enjoys "Confusion"; Aids Justice Department

ontly Dispatch Bureau. In The Sir Watter Hotel Raleigh, Jan. 14.-Widespread confusion and inaction in the matter of slot machines and "bookies" on the nart of local authorities is furnishing advocates of a State Department of Justice with more than a little ammunition.

They point out that these matters would be brought to a speedy determination if there were a central law enforcement bureau for the State. A Department of Justice, they con-

tend, would soon find out whether or not the so-called "silent salesman", now protected in some jurisdictions by a Federal court injunction, are violations of the Flannagan anti-slot machine law; and it would soon get a final verdict on whether any one openly maintain a betting establishment in North Carolina on the plea that it does nothing but receive and transmit money to states where horse race betting is legal.

As it is, the slots and the bookies are laughing at the baffled and ineffective local authorities.
