

Car Hits Pedestrians; Three Killed, Four Hurt

Alleged Drunken Driver Fails to Stop After Driving Vehicle Into Persons Walking Along Durham-Raleigh Highway—Held Without Bond

Durham, Aug. 18.—(AP)—Three persons were killed and four injured one seriously, when Eugene M. Evans allegedly intoxicated, drove his automobile yesterday afternoon into a group of persons on the Raleigh-Durham highway, Sheriff E. G. Belvin said today.

The sheriff said Evans, who lives near the scene of the accident only recently was released from the state hospital at Raleigh, where he underwent treatment for chronic alcoholism.

Three Are Killed.

The dead: Barbara Medlin, three years old, a Raleigh road resident.

Mrs. Maggie Medlin, 45, grandmother of the dead child. She succumbed to injuries in a hospital here last night.

E. E. Jones, about 60, East Durham resident and foreman of a state highway gang that was at work when the accident occurred.

The injured: Thomas Nelson Salmon, employe of a Raleigh road service station, in a serious condition.

Catherine Medlin, eight, sister of the dead child.

Fadine Medlin, three, another sister.

Betty Jean Medlin, five, a third sister.

Evans, a city letter carrier, is married and has one child, a boy around 11 years old, Sheriff Belvin said.

Failed to Stop.

Officers said he did not stop after the accident, but continued up the road for about a mile, where he drove his automobile into a ditch. A friend, Edgar Hudson, noticed him and drove the car to Evans' home.

Sheriff Belvin said three manslaughter warrants will be issued, one for each dead person, and that the warrants will cover hit-run and

drunken driving charges. The county officer said he will not fix bond, but will hold Evans in jail here until he is given a hearing. Sheriff Belvin said he will take all precautions to prevent a suicide on Evans' part after he becomes sober and realizes what he has done.

The grandmother and the children were on their way home after having been swimming. They stopped to talk with Salmon and Jones, and then walked up the road a short distance before being struck.

Witnesses said Evans was driving between 65 and 70 miles per hour and that his car left the pavement on the right side, hurling into the pedestrians. Several of those struck were thrown off the embankment but the automobile did not leave the shoulder.

Both clubs turned in a flashy brand of baseball. The teams will meet again Sunday afternoon at Red Sox Park.
