

Cover both the roots and stems with soil. heads may be set close enough for the three rows of plants. Set a board or plank on edge on each side of the trench and bank on the outside with soil. Cover with pine brush or cornstalks. When severe weather arrives, it might be advisable to throw a light layer of soil over the brush or corn-

Cabbage may be stored in a manner similar to collards in Eastern Carolina. In Western Carolina where ex treme freezing weather occurs, the following method of storing is practiced. Dig a shallow pit about six inches deep and six feet wide. The length of the pit will vary in proportion to the quantity stored. Ridge poles or wood slabs are then laid across the shellow pit in order to supacross the shallow pit in order to sup-port the cabbage heads. Openings are made through the sides of the pit to provide for bottom ventilation. The ventilating openings are closed during extreme freezing weather.
