

Army Planes Fall

Paris, April 22.-(AP)-One of the worst series of accidents ever suffered by French aviation cost 20 lives and four of France's best fighting planes today and yesterday.

First of the fatal crashes occurred yesterday when an army bomber burst into flames over a northern French Morocco spot and crashed killing all of the crew of six men. Shortly before last midnight,

a second bomber, with a crew of five, crashed near Beauvais, while on night maneuvers. The entire crew was killed.

This morning two heavy bomb ers collided in mid-air as they were preparing to land at the Tours military airport. Nine officers and men aboard the two planes were burned to death.


