HOSPITAL CONTRACTS TOTAL OVER \$500,000

Morganton, May 25.—Directors of State hospital yesterday awarded to V. P. Loftis Construction Company, Charlotte, a contract for \$472,000 to fireproof both wings of the institution's huge center building.

The contract was the largest in the day's letting which totaled \$535,937, coming as a part of a fireproofing and remodeling program of a million and a quarter dollars.

Abee and Eckard, Icard contractors, received the contract for remodeling the Scroggs building on a low bid of \$47,500.

Mexican Sets Speed Record On Long Flight

New York, May 25.—(AP)—Francisco Sarabia, the "Mexican Lindbergh", broke the Mexico City-New York speed record set by the late Amelia Earhart in 1935 when he landed at Floyd Bennett airport late yesterday.

His flying time for the 2,085-miles was approximately 10 hours 48 minutes, compared with Miss Earhart's 14 hours 19 minutes.

As the yellow five-year-old low-winged monoplane swept over the field, disappeared to the east momentarily and then put its wheels on, downwind—surprisingly enough, downwind—several hundred spectators broke into cheers.

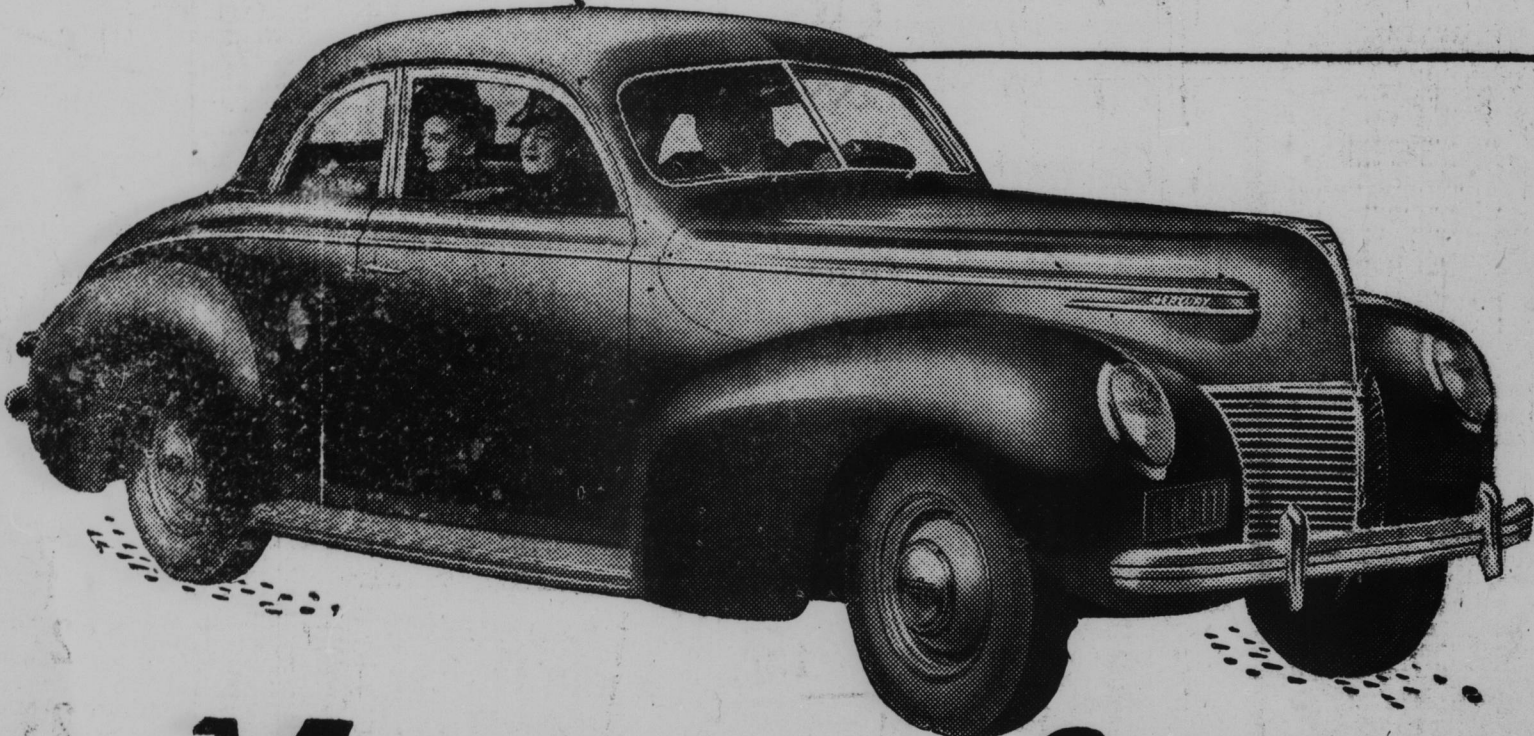

DR. COOPER RESIGNS FROM PRISON POST

Raleigh, May 25.—(AP)—Dr. E. C. Cooper resigned today as director of religious training in the North Carolina prison system, to accept an appointment as president of Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in Columbia, S. C.

Dr. Cooper said he expected to assume his duties July 1.

Born in China Grove, Dr. Cooper was graduated from Roanoke Col-

lege and Philadelphia Lutheran Seminary. He received a master of arts degree from Princeton university and a Doctor of Philosophy degree from Hartford School of Religion.

He has served in pastorates in Lynchburg, Va., Philadelphia, Albemarle and Shelby, and organized missions for the Lutheran church in Belmont, North Kannapolis and Morganton.

Dr. Cooper became the first director of religious training in North Carolina prisons in October, 1937. He has ministered, h—iazngremfvy

He has ministered particularly to men awaiting execution and persons in the hospital at Central prison here.
